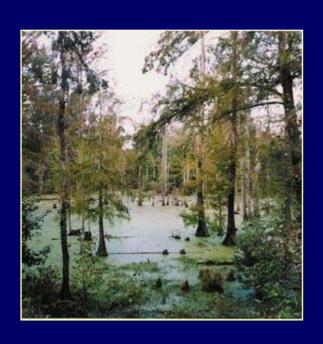

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### **Brief Overview**

- \$698,372 in state funds was spent without any benefit to the environment
- Department of Environment and Natural Resources policies have been changed
- Potential for future environmental loss remains



## Background

### EBX is paid twice for wetlands work

- News & Observer 12/8/09

- Explored the controversy publicized in the News & Observer in December
- Did the state spend nearly \$1 million and get nothing in return?

# Compensatory Wetland Mitigation

- Developers must compensate for environmental damage by:
  - Doing the workthemselves
  - Paying for credits

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# The Crux of the Controversy

- DENR certified credits from one 46-acre area in the Neuse River basin
- Overlapping credits
  were sold twice, the
  second time to the state



DENR policies allowed this to happen

### The Bottom Line



- Alleged overlap in credits sold cited in the N&O = \$910,920
- Actual overlap based on Program Evaluation Division analysis = \$698,372
- Net loss to North Carolina's environment

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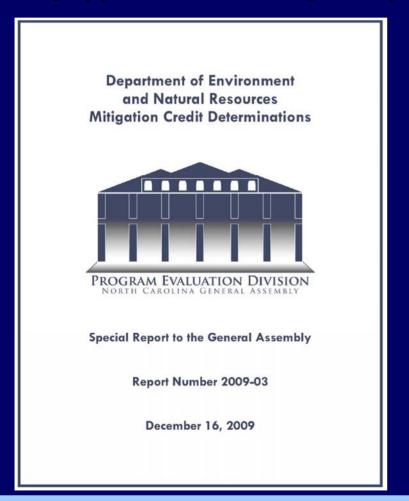
# Summary

- \$698,372 in state funds bought no benefit
- New policy prohibits future similar approvals, but previously approved overlapping credits can still be sold
- School of Government evaluation of the Ecosystem Enhancement Program is planned
