- 2 AN ACT TO REGULATE THE TEMPERATURE OF HOME WATER HEATERS TO
- 3 HELP REDUCE THE RISK OF INJURIES AND DEATH.
- 4 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

5	Section 1.	Chapter	143	of the	General	Statutes is	amended	by adding	g a new
6	section to read:								

7 "§ 143-143.3. Water heater thermostat settings.

8 The thermostat of any new residential water heater offered for sale or lease (a) for use in a single-family or multi-unit residential dwelling in this State shall be preset 9 by the manufacturer no higher than 120° Fahrenheit (or 49° Celsius). A water heating 10 system may utilize a higher reservoir temperature if mixing valves are set or the system 11 is designed to restrict the temperature of water at the point it flows from the tap to 120° 12 Fahrenheit (or 49° Celsius). For purposes of this section, a water heater shall mean the 13 primary source of hot water for any single-family or multi-unit residential dwelling, 14 15 including, but not limited to, any solar or other hot water heating system. The thermostat of any accessible, individual water heater that is located in (b)16 any single-family or multi-unit residential dwelling that is leased or rented in this State 17 shall, prior to occupancy by a new tenant, be reset by the owner of the residential 18 dwelling at a temperature not higher than 120° Fahrenheit (or 49° Celsius). A water 19 heating system may utilize a higher reservoir temperature if mixing valves are set or the 20 system is designed to restrict the temperature of water at the point it flows from the tap 21 to 120° Fahrenheit (or 49° Celsius). 22 23 The thermostat of any water heater which is located in a multi-unit residential (c) dwelling and which is the source of hot water for two or more residential units shall be 24

- set by the owner of the dwelling so as to restrict the temperature of water at the point it
 flows from the tap to 120° Fahrenheit (or 49° Celsius).
- 3 (d) Nothing in this section shall prohibit the occupant of a single-family or multi-
- 4 unit residential dwelling with an individual water heater from resetting the thermostat
- 5 on the water heater. Any such resetting shall relieve the manufacturer of the water
- 6 <u>heater and, in the case of a residential dwelling that is leased or rented, also the unit's</u> 7 owner from liability for damages attributed to the resotting
- 7 owner, from liability for damages attributed to the resetting.
- 8 (e) The manufacturer of a residential water heater under this section that is
- 9 offered for sale or installed after the effective date of this act shall attach a tag to the
- 10 thermostat access plate or, in the case of exposed thermostats, immediately adjacent
- 11 thereto, stating that thermostat settings above the preset temperature may cause severe
- 12 <u>burns and consume excessive energy.</u>
- 13 (f) Nothing in this section requires or permits any inspections other than those
 14 otherwise required or permitted by law."
