Technical Considerations/Comments

The direct and immediate costs to implement HB 156 over the 89-91 biennium is estimated to be \$17,664 per year. This figure relates only to the travel, per diem, and subsistence costs of the "Watershed Protection Advisory Council". Though the Department of Natural Resources and Community Development indicates that the requirements of HB 156 can be accommodated over the 89-91 biennium without additional appropriations, additional funds will be required in subsequent years. Adequate staff personnel in the Division of Environmental Management are currently available

to handle the initial workload increases over the 89-91 biennium, if HB 156 is enacted. However, beginning in the 1991-92 fiscal year, the Department will require additional appropriations for personnel and support to implement the provisions of HB 156. These appropriations will likely be requested in the 91-92 biennial budget request and could range between \$200,000 and \$400,000 depending on the number of positions required in field offices to review watershed protection plans and provide technical assistance to local governments.

Section 1(h) of HB 156 authorizes the Secretary of the Department of Natural Resources and Community Development to make annual grants to local governments for the purpose of assisting in the development of local water supply watershed protection programs. Funds are not currently appropriated by the General Assembly and neither does the bill request an appropriation for this purpose.
