Sec. 2. G.S. 20-7(i1) reads as rewritten:

21 "(i1) Any person whose driver's license or other privilege to operate a motor 22 vehicle in this State has been suspended, canceled or revoked pursuant to the provisions 23 of this Chapter, other than G.S. 20-17(2), shall pay a restoration fee of twenty-five 24 dollars (\$25.00). A person whose driver's license has been revoked under G.S. 20-17(2) 25 shall pay a restoration fee of fifty dollars (\$50.00) until the end of the fiscal year in which the cumulative total amount of fees deposited under this subsection in the 26 27 General Fund exceeds five million dollars (\$5,000,000), and shall pay a restoration fee 28 of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) thereafter. This restoration fee shall not be required 32 from any licensee whose license was suspended, canceled, revoked or voluntarily 33 surrendered for medical or health reasons whether or not a medical evaluation was 34 conducted pursuant to this Chapter. The twenty-five dollar (\$25.00) fee, and the first 35 twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) of the fifty-dollar (\$50.00) fee, shall be deposited in the Highway Fund. The remaining twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) of the fifty-dollar (\$50.00) 36 fee shall be deposited in the General Fund of the State. The Office of State Budget and 37 38 Management shall certify to the Department of Transportation and the General 39 Assembly when the cumulative total amount of fees deposited in the General Fund 40 under this subsection exceeds five million dollars (\$5,000,000), and shall annually 41 report to the General Assembly the amount of fees deposited in the General Fund under 42 this subsection.

It shall be the duty of the Board of Medical Examiners to examine for license to 11 practice medicine or surgery, or any of the branches thereof, every applicant who 12 complies with the following provisions: He shall, before he is admitted to examination, 13 14 satisfy the Board that he has an academic education equal to the entrance requirements 15 of the The University of North Carolina, Carolina System, or furnish a certificate from 16 the superintendent of public instruction of the county that he has passed an examination 17 upon his literary attainments to meet the requirements of entrance in the regular course 18 of the State University. He shall exhibit a diploma or furnish satisfactory proof of 19 graduation from a medical college or an osteopathic college approved by the American 20 Osteopathic Association at the time of his graduation, which time of graduation shall 21 have been on January 1, 1960, or subsequent thereto and which medical and osteopathic 22 schools shall require an attendance of not less than four years or for a lesser period of 23 time approved by the Board, and supply such facilities for clinical and scientific 24 instruction as shall meet the approval of the Board. An applicant shall have graduated from a medical college approved by the Liaison Commission on Medical Education or 25 osteopathic college that has been approved by the American Osteopathic Association; 26 27 or, if he was graduated from any other medical or osteopathic college, the applicant 28 shall be enrolled in a graduate medical education and training program in North 29 Carolina which has been approved by the Board. An applicant who has graduated from 30 a medical college not approved by the Liaison Commission on Medical Education or osteopathic college that has not been approved by the American Osteopathic 31 32 Association and who has not enrolled in a graduate medical education and training program in North Carolina which has been approved by the Board shall satisfy the 33 Board that he has successfully completed three years of graduate medical education in a 34 35 training program approved by the Board. No applicant from a medical or osteopathic 36 college which has been disapproved by the Board shall be eligible to take the 37 examination.

The examination shall cover the branches of medical science and subjects which the Board deems necessary to determine competence to practice medicine. The Board may divide the examination into parts or components.

If the applicant successfully passes the examination, as determined by the Board,
and if the applicant satisfies the Board that he is of good moral character and that either,
(1) if the applicant is a graduate of a medical college approved by the Liaison
Commission on Medical Education or osteopathic college approved by the American

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1	Osteopathic Association, he has successfully completed one year of training in a
2	medical education program approved by the Board after graduation from medical
2	school; or (2) if the applicant is a graduate of a medical college that has not been
4	approved by the Liaison Commission on Medical Education or osteopathic college that
4 5	has not been approved by the American Osteopathic Association, he has successfully
6 7	completed three years of training in a medical education program approved by the
7	Board after graduation from medical school, then the Board shall grant the applicant a
8	license authorizing him to practice medicine in any of its branches.
9	Applicants shall be examined by number only; names and other identifying
10	information shall not appear on examination papers."

36	(2) Make studies and undertake programs of research to:
37	a. Develop new or improved approaches, techniques, systems,
38	equipment, and devices to strengthen the enforcement of this
39	Article;
40	b. Determine patterns of misuse and abuse of controlled
41	substances and the social effect thereof; and
42	c. Improve methods for preventing, predicting, understanding, and
43	dealing with the misuse and abuse of controlled substances.

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1 2	(3) Enter into contracts with other public agencies, any district attorney, institutions of higher education, and private organizations or
3 4	individuals for the purpose of conducting research, demonstrations, or special projects which bear directly on misuse and abuse of controlled

6 7	(d) The North Carolina Department of Human Resources may enter into contracts for research activities related to controlled substances, and the North Carolina Department of Pablic Instruction and the Decard of Commune of the The University of
