## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

# 2 AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE THE NATIONAL GUARD TO OPEN POST 3 EXCHANGES AT THE AIR NATIONAL GUARD BASE IN CHARLOTTE AND 4 THE NATIONAL GUARD HEADQUARTERS IN RALEIGH.

5 Whereas, the North Carolina National Guard, including the Army National 6 Guard and the Air National Guard, includes more than 13,000 full-time and part-time 7 soldiers; and

8 Whereas, the North Carolina National Guard Headquarters located at the 9 Claude T. Bowers Military Center at 4105 Reedy Creek Road, Raleigh, is the site of 10 employment for over 500 full-time military personnel and over 300 additional part-time 11 personnel who attend inactive duty training drills at least one weekend per month; and

Whereas, the North Carolina Air National Guard Headquarters located at Douglas International Airport at 5225 Morris Field Drive, Charlotte, is the site of employment for over 275 full-time military personnel and over 1,000 additional parttime personnel who attend inactive duty training drills at least one weekend per month; and

Whereas, there are thousands of military-related people including military retirees; military personnel of all branches of service of the active, guard, and reserve components; military dependents; Reserve Officer Training Corps cadets; and patients and employees of Veterans Administration hospitals all living or working here in North Carolina, and, in particular, living and working within a 15-mile radius of Charlotte and Raleigh; and

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1	Whereas, there is no active military center with an active-duty post exchange			
2	within 50 miles of these two cities to provide a readily accessible service to those			
3	military-related people; and			
4	Whereas, the North Carolina National Guard, in conjunction with the Army			
5	and Air Force Exchange Service, desires to establish an exchange outlet or outlets to			
6	serve these military-related people at the Military Center in Raleigh and at the Air			
7	National Guard Center in Charlotte; and			
8 9	Whereas, to implement the establishment of these exchanges would require amendments to certain existing North Carolina statutes; Now, therefore,			
10	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:			
11	Section 1. Chapter 127A of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new			
12	section to read:			
13	"§ 127A-156. Establishment of post exchanges.			
14	The North Carolina National Guard, in conjunction with the Army and Air Force			
15	Exchange Service, may establish post exchanges at the Claude T. Bowers Military			
16	Center in Raleigh, at the Air National Guard Center in Charlotte, and at other locations			
17	approved by the Adjutant General of North Carolina."			
18	Sec. 2. G.S. 66-58(c) reads as rewritten:			
19	"(c) The provisions of subsection (a) shall not prohibit:			
20	(1) The sale of products of experiment stations or test farms.			
21	(2) The sale of learned journals, works of art, books or publications of the			
22	Department of Cultural Resources or other agencies, or the Supreme			
23	Court Reports or Session Laws of the General Assembly.			
24	(3) The business operation of endowment funds established for the			
25	purpose of producing income for educational purposes; for purposes of			
26	this section, the phrase 'operation of endowment funds' shall include			
27	the operation by public postsecondary educational institutions of			
28	campus stores, the profits from which are used exclusively for			
29	awarding scholarships to defray the expenses of students attending the			
30	institution; provided, that the operation of such stores must be			
31	approved by the board of trustees of the institution, and the			
32	merchandise sold shall be limited to educational materials and			
33	supplies, gift items and miscellaneous personal-use articles. Provided			
34	further that sales at campus stores are limited to employees of the			
35	institution and members of their immediate families, to duly enrolled			
36	students and their immediate families, to other campus stores and to			
37	other persons who are on campus other than for the purpose of			
38	purchasing merchandise from campus stores. It is the intent of this			
39 40	subdivision that campus stores be established and operated for the			
40	purpose of assuring the availability of merchandise described in this			
41 42	Article for sale to persons enumerated herein and not for the purpose of competing with stores operated in the communities surrounding the

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1		(4)	The operation of lunch counters by the Department of Human
2		(-)	Resources as blind enterprises of the type operated on January 1, 1951,
3			in State buildings in the City of Raleigh.
4		(5)	The operation of a snack bar and cafeteria in the State Legislative
5			Building.
6		(6)	The maintenance by the prison system authorities of eating and
7			sleeping facilities at units of the State prison system for prisoners and
8			for members of the prison staff while on duty, or the maintenance by
9			the highway system authorities of eating and sleeping facilities for
10			working crews on highway construction or maintenance when actually
11		( <b>7</b> )	engaged in such work on parts of the highway system.
12 13		(7)	The operation by penal, correctional or facilities operated by the Department of Human Resources or by the State Department of
14			Agriculture, of dining rooms for the inmates or clients or members of
15			the staff while on duty and for the accommodation of persons visiting
16			such inmates or clients, and other bona fide visitors.
17		(8)	The sale by the Department of Agriculture of livestock, poultry and
18			publications in keeping with its present livestock and farm program.
19		(9)	The operation by the public schools of school cafeterias.
20		(10)	Sale by any State correctional or other institution of farm, dairy,
21			livestock or poultry products raised or produced by it in its normal
22			operations as authorized by the act creating it.
23		(11)	The sale of textbooks, library books, forms, bulletins, and instructional
24			supplies by the State Board of Education, State Department of Public
25			Instruction, and local school authorities.
26		(12)	The sale of North Carolina flags by or through the auspices of the
27			Department of Administration, to the citizens of North Carolina.
28		(13)	
29			management programs on State-owned lands, including the sale on the
30			open market of timber cut as a part of such management program.
31		(14)	The operation by the Department of Correction of facilities to
32			manufacture and produce traffic and street name signs for use on the
33			public streets and highways of the State.

37		<u>(16)</u>	The operation of post exchanges by the Army and Air Force Exchange
