4	Sec. 2. G.S. 74-50 reads as rewritten:
5	"§ 74-50. Permits – General.
6	After July 1, 1972, no operator shall engage in mining without having first obtained
7	from the Department an operating permit which covers the affected land and which has
8	not terminated, been revoked, been suspended for the period in question, or otherwise
9	become invalid. An operating permit may be modified from time to time to include
10	land neighboring the affected land, in accordance with procedures set forth in G.S. 74-
11	52. A separate permit shall be required for each mining operation that is not on land
12	neighboring a mining operation for which the operator has a valid permit.
13	No permit shall be issued except in accordance with the procedures set forth in G.S.
14 15	74-51, nor modified or renewed except in accordance with the procedures set forth in G.S. 74-52.
15 16	An appeal from the Department's denial of a permit may be taken to the Mining
17	Commission, as provided by G.S. 74-61.
18	Prior to the issuance of a new mining permit, At the time of the application for a new
19	mining permit or permit modifications that add owners of record of lands adjoining the
20	permit boundaries, the operator shall make a reasonable effort, satisfactory to the
21	Department, to notify all owners of record of land adjoining the proposed site, and to
22	notify the chief administrative officer of the county or municipality in which the site is
23	located that he intends to conduct a mining operation on the site in question. <u>The notice</u>
24	shall inform the owners of record and chief administrative officers of the opportunity to
25	submit written comments to the Department regarding the proposed mining operation
26	and the opportunity to request a public hearing regarding the proposed mining
27	operation. Requests for public hearing shall be made within 30 days of issuance of the
28	notice.
29	No permit shall become effective until the operator has deposited with the
30	Department an acceptable performance bond or other security pursuant to G.S. 74-54.
31	If at any time said bond or other security, or any part thereof, shall lapse for any reason
32	other than a release by the Department, and said lapsed bond or security is not replaced
33	by the operator within 30 days after notice of the lapse, the permit to which it pertains
34	shall automatically become void and of no further effect.
35	An operating permit shall be granted for a period not exceeding 10 years. If the
36	mining operation terminates and the reclamation required under the approved
37	reclamation plan is completed prior to the end of said period, the permit shall terminate.
38	Termination of a permit shall not have the effect of relieving the operator of any
39	obligations which he has incurred under his approved reclamation plan or otherwise.
40	Where the mining operation itself has terminated, no permit shall be required in order to
41	carry out reclamation measures under the reclamation plan.
42 43	An operating permit may be <u>modified or</u> renewed from time to time, pursuant to procedures set forth in G S 74-52

An operating permit may be suspended or revoked for cause, pursuant to procedures 1 2 set forth in G.S. 74-58." 3 Sec. 3. G.S. 74-51 reads as rewritten: "§ 74-51. Permits – Application, granting, conditions. 4 5 Any operator desiring to engage in mining shall make written application to the 6 Department for a permit. Such application shall be upon a form furnished by the 7 Department and shall fully state the information called for; in addition, the applicant 8 may be required to furnish such other information as may be deemed necessary by the 9 Department in order adequately to enforce this Article. 10 The application shall be accompanied by a reclamation plan which meets the requirements of G.S. 74-53. No permit shall be issued until such plan has been 11 12 approved by the Department. 13 The application shall be accompanied by a signed agreement, in a form specified by the Department, that in the event a bond forfeiture is ordered pursuant to G.S. 74-59, the 14 15 Department and its representatives and its contractors shall have the right to make 16 whatever entries on the land and to take whatever actions may be necessary in order to 17 carry out reclamation which the operator has failed to complete. 18 Before deciding whether to grant a new permit, the Department shall circulate copies of a notice of application for review and comment as it deems advisable. 19 The 20 Department shall grant or deny the permit requested as expeditiously as possible, but in 21 no event later than 60 days after the application form and any relevant and material supplemental information reasonably required shall have been filed with the 22 23 Department, or if a public hearing is held, within 30 days following the hearing and the 24 filing of any relevant and material supplemental information reasonably required by the Department. Priority consideration shall be given to applicants who submit evidence 25 that the mining proposed will be for the purpose of supplying materials to the Board of 26 27 Transportation. 28 Upon its determination that significant public interest exists, exists based on public 29 comment relevant to the provisions of this Article, the Department shall conduct a 30 public hearing on any application for a new mining permit. permit or for permit modifications that add owners of record of lands adjoining the permit boundaries. Such 31 32 hearing shall be held before the Department reaches a final decision on the application, 33 and in making its determination, the Department shall give full consideration to all 34 comments submitted at the public hearing. Such public hearing shall be held within 60 35 days of the filing of the application.-end of the 30-day period within which any requests 36 for the public hearing shall be made. 37 The Department may deny such permit upon finding: 38 That any requirement of this Article or any rule promulgated (1) 39 hereunder will be violated by the proposed operation; That the operation will have unduly adverse effects on potable 40 (2)41 groundwater supplies, or on wildlife or fresh water, estuarine, or

1 appeal shall be taken more than 60 days after notice of disapproval has been mailed to him at

2 the address shown on his application. <u>G.S. 74-61</u>.

Upon approval of an application, the Department shall set the amount of the performance bond or other security which is to be required pursuant to G.S. 74-54. The operator shall have 60 days following the mailing of such notification in which to deposit the required bond or security with the Department. The operating permit shall not be issued until receipt of this deposit.

8 When one operator succeeds to the interest of another in any uncompleted mining 9 operation, by virtue of a sale, lease, assignment, or otherwise, the Department may 10 release the first operator from the duties imposed upon him by this Article with 11 reference to such operation and transfer the permit to the successor operator; provided, 12 that both operators have complied with the requirements of this Article and that the 13 successor operator assumes the duties of the first operator with reference to reclamation 14 of the land and posts a suitable bond or other security."

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Sec. 4. G.S. 74-52 reads as rewritten:

#### 16 "§ 74-52. Permits – Modification, renewal.

Any operator engaged in mining under an operating permit may apply at any time 17 for modification of said permit, and at any time during the two years prior to its 18 19 expiration date for renewal of the permit. Such-The application shall be in writing upon 20 forms furnished by the Department and shall fully state the information called for; in-for. 21 The applicant must provide the Department with any additional information necessary 22 to satisfy the Department's current application requirements. The applicant is not 23 required to resubmit information which remains unchanged since the time of the prior application. In addition, the applicant may be required to furnish such other information 24 25 as may be deemed necessary by the Department in order adequately to enforce the 26 Article. However, it shall not be necessary to resubmit information which has not changed 27 since the time of a prior application, where the applicant states in writing that such information 28 has not changed.

The procedure to be followed and standards to be applied in renewing a permit shall be the same as those for issuing a permit; provided, however, that in the absence of any changes in legal requirements for issuance of a permit since the date on which the prior permit was issued, the only basis for denying a renewal permit shall be an uncorrected violation of the type listed in G.S. 74-51(7), or failure to submit an adequate reclamation plan in light of conditions then existing.

35 A modification under this section may affect the land area covered by the permit, the approved reclamation plan coupled with the permit, or other terms and conditions of the 36 permit. A permit may be modified to include land neighboring the affected land, but 37 not other lands. The reclamation plan may be modified in any manner, so long as the 38 39 Department determines that the modified plan fully meets the standards set forth in G.S. 40 74-53 and that the modifications would be generally consistent with the bases for 41 issuance of the original permit. Other terms and conditions may be modified only 42 where the Department determines that the permit as modified would meet all 43 requirements of G.S. 74-50 and 74-51. No modification shall extend the expiration date of any permit issued under this Article. 44

1 In lieu of a modification or a renewal, an operator may apply for a new permit in the 2 manner prescribed by G.S. 74-50 and 74-51.

No modification or renewal of a permit shall become effective until any required changes have been made in the performance bond or other security posted under the provisions of G.S. 74-54, so as to assure the performance of obligations assumed by the operator under the permit and reclamation plan."

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Sec. 5. G.S. 74-54 reads as rewritten:

#### 8 "§ 74-54. Bonds.

9 Each applicant for an operating permit, or for the renewal thereof, shall file with the 10 Department following approval of his application and shall thereafter maintain in force 11 a bond in favor of the State of North Carolina, executed by a surety approved by the 12 Commissioner of Insurance, in the amount set forth below. The bond herein provided 13 for must be continuous in nature and shall remain in force until cancelled by the surety. 14 Cancellation by the surety shall be effectuated only upon 60 days written notice thereof 15 to the Department and to the operator.

16 The applicant shall have the option of filing a separate bond for each operating 17 permit or of filing a blanket bond covering all mining operations within the State for 18 which he holds a permit. The amount of each bond shall be based upon the area of 19 affected land to be reclaimed under the approved reclamation plan or plans to which it 20 pertains, less any such area where reclamation has been completed and released from 21 coverage by the Department, pursuant to G.S. 74-56, or based on such other criteria 22 established by the Mining Commission. The Department shall set the amount of the 23 required bond in all cases, based upon a schedule established by the Mining 24 Commission.

25 The bond shall be conditioned upon the faithful performance of the requirements set forth in this Article and of the rules adopted pursuant thereto. Upon filing the bond with 26 27 the Department, the operator shall lose all right, title, and interest in the bond while the bond is held by the Department. Liability under the bond shall be maintained as long as 28 29 reclamation is not completed in compliance with the approved reclamation plan unless 30 released only upon written notification from the Department. Notification shall be given upon completion of compliance or acceptance by the Department of a substitute 31 32 bond. In no event shall the liability of the surety exceed the amount of the surety bond 33 required by this section.

In lieu of the surety bond required by this section, the operator may file with the Department a cash deposit, negotiable securities, a mortgage of real property acceptable to the Department, or an irrevocable letter of credit, a guaranty of payment from an acceptable bank, an assignment of a savings account in a North Carolina an acceptable bank on an assignment form prescribed by the Department. Department, or other security acceptable to the Department. Security shall be subject to the release provisions of G.S. 74-56.

If the license to do business in North Carolina of any surety upon a bond filed pursuant to this Article should be suspended or revoked, the operator shall, within 60 days after receiving notice thereof, substitute for such surety a good and sufficient

corporate surety authorized to do business in this State. Upon failure of the operator to 1 2

make such substitution, his permit shall automatically become void and of no effect."

Sec. 6. G.S. 74-54.1 reads as rewritten:

"§ 74-54.1. Permit fees. 4

5 The Commission may establish a fee schedule for the processing of permit 6 applications and permit renewals and modifications. The fees may vary on the basis of 7 the acreage, size, and nature of the proposed or permitted operations or modifications. 8 In establishing the fee schedule, the Commission shall consider the administrative and 9 personnel costs incurred by the Department for processing applications for permits and 10 permit renewals and modifications and for related compliance activities and safeguards to prevent unusual fee assessments that would impose a serious economic burden on an 11 12 individual applicant or a class of applicants.

The total amount of permit fees collected for any fiscal year may not exceed one-13 14 third of the total personnel and administrative costs incurred by the Department for 15 processing applications for permits and permit renewals and modifications and for 16 related compliance costs in the prior fiscal year. A fee for an application for a new 17 permit may not exceed two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), and a fee for an 18 application to renew or modify a permit may not exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00). 19 The Mining Account is established. The Mining Account is a nonreverting account 20 within the Department, to be administered by the State Treasurer. The Mining Account 21 shall be treated as a special trust fund and shall be credited with interest by the State Treasurer pursuant to G.S. 147-69.2 and G.S. 147-69.3. Fees collected under this 22 23 section shall be credited to the Mining Account and shall be applied to the costs of 24 administering this Article.

25 The Department shall make an annual report to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations and the Director of the Fiscal Research Division on the cost 26 27 of the State's mining permit program. The report shall include the fees established, collected, and disbursed under this section and any other information requested by the 28 29 General Assembly or the Commission."

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Sec. 7. G.S. 74-56 reads as rewritten:

#### 31 "§ 74-56. Inspection and approval of reclamation; bond release or forfeiture.

32 The Department may direct investigations as it may reasonably deem necessary to carry out its duties as prescribed by this Article, and for this purpose to enter at 33 34 reasonable times upon any mining operation for the purpose of determining compliance 35 with this Article and any rules adopted pursuant to this Article and for determining compliance with the terms and conditions of a mining permit, but for no other purpose. 36 No person shall refuse entry or access to any authorized representative of the 37 38 Department who enters the mining operation for purposes of inspection or other official 39 duties and who presents appropriate credentials; nor shall any person obstruct, hamper, or interfere with the representative while in the process of carrying out his official 40 duties. Upon arriving at the site, the representative of the Department shall make every 41 42 reasonable effort to notify the operator or the operator's agent that he intends to inspect the site. If there is no person on the site or if the site is not permitted pursuant to this 43 44 Article, the representative of the Department may inspect the site. Upon receipt of the

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operator's annual report or report of completion of reclamation and at any other 1 2 reasonable time the Department may elect, the Department shall cause the permit area to 3 be inspected to determine whether the operator has complied with the reclamation plan, 4 the requirements of this Article, any rules promulgated hereunder, adopted pursuant to this Article, and the terms and conditions of his permit. Accredited representatives of the 5 6 Department shall have the right at all reasonable times to enter upon the land subject to the 7 permit for the purpose of making such inspection and investigation. 8 The operator shall proceed with reclamation as scheduled in the approved

9 reclamation plan. Following its inspection, the Department shall give written notice to 10 the operator of any deficiencies noted. The operator shall thereupon commence action 11 within 30 days to rectify these deficiencies and shall diligently proceed until they have 12 been corrected. The Department may extend performance periods referred to in this 13 section and in G.S. 74-53 for delays clearly beyond the operator's control, but only in 14 cases where the Department finds that the operator is making every reasonable effort to 15 comply.

Upon completion of reclamation of an area of affected land, the operator shall notify the Department. The Department shall make an inspection of the area, and if it finds that reclamation has been properly completed, it shall notify the operator in writing and release him from further obligations regarding such affected land. At the same time it shall release all or the appropriate portion of any performance bond or other security which he has posted under G.S. 74-54.

22 If at any time the Department finds that reclamation of the permit area is not 23 proceeding in accordance with the reclamation plan and that the operator has failed 24 within 30 days after notice to commence corrective action, or if the Department finds 25 that reclamation has not been properly completed in conformance with the reclamation plan within two years, or longer if authorized by the Department, after termination of 26 27 mining on any segment of the permit area, it shall initiate forfeiture proceedings against the bond or other security filed by the operator under G.S. 74-59. In addition, such 28 29 failure shall constitute grounds for suspension or revocation of the operator's permit, as 30 provided in G.S. 74-58."

Sec. 8. G.S. 74-58 reads as rewritten:

#### 32 "§ 74-58. Suspension or revocation of permit.

33 Whenever the Department shall have reason to believe that a violation of (i) this Article, (ii) any rules promulgated hereunder, or (iii) the terms and conditions of a 34 35 permit, including the approved reclamation plan, has taken place, it shall serve written 36 notice of such fact upon the operator, specifying the facts constituting such apparent 37 violation and informing the operator of his right to a hearing. an informal conference 38 with the Department. The date for such hearing an informal conference shall be not less 39 than 30-15 nor more than 60-30 days after the date of the notice, unless the Department 40 and the operator shall-mutually agree on another date. The operator may appear at the 41 hearing, either personally or through counsel, and present such evidence as he may desire in 42 order to prove that no violation has taken place or exists. 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3 The effective date of any such suspension or revocation shall be 30 days following the date of the decision. An appeal to the Mining Commission The filing of a petition for a 4 5 contested case under G.S. 74-61 shall stay such effective date until the Commission's 6 decision. A further appeal to superior court under G.S. 74-61 shall stay such effective date 7 until the date of the superior court judgment. If the Department finds at the time of its 8 initial decision that any delay in correcting a violation would result in imminent peril to life or danger to property or to the environment, it shall promptly initiate a proceeding 9 10 for injunctive relief under G.S. 74-64 hereof and Rule 65 of the Rules of Civil Procedure. The pendency of any appeal from a suspension or revocation of a permit 11 12 shall have no effect upon such action. 13 Any operator whose permit has been suspended or revoked shall be denied a new 14 permit or a renewal of the old permit to engage in mining until he gives evidence 15 satisfactory to the Department of his ability and intent to fully comply with the 16 provisions of this Article and rules promulgated hereunder, and the terms and conditions of his permit, including the approved reclamation plan, and that he has satisfactorily 17 18 corrected all previous violations." 19 Sec. 9. G.S. 74-61 reads as rewritten: 20 "§ 74-61. Administrative and judicial review of decisions. 21 Any affected person may contest a decision of the Department to deny, suspend, 22 modify, or revoke a permit or a reclamation plan, to refuse to release part or all of a 23 bond or other security, or to assess a civil penalty by filing a petition for a contested 24 case under G.S. 150B-23 within 60-30 days after the Department makes the decision.
