A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 2 AN ACT TO LIMIT POLICE PURSUITS BY ESTABLISHING A PRIMA FACIE

RULE OF EVIDENCE CONCERNING THE OPERATOR OF A VEHICLE SPEEDING IN EXCESS OF TWENTY-FIVE MILES AN HOUR OVER THE

SPEED LIMIT TO ELUDE ARREST AND TO INCREASE THE PENALTY.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

Section 1. Chapter 20 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

### "§ 20-141.5. Speeding to elude arrest.

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- It shall be unlawful for a person to operate a vehicle on a street, highway, or public vehicular area in excess of 25 miles per hour over the speed limit while fleeing or attempting to elude a law enforcement officer who is in the lawful performance of duties with the blue light flashing. A person violating this subsection shall be guilty of a Class J felony.
- It shall be unlawful for a person to knowingly authorize or permit a vehicle (b) owned by that person, or under that person's control, to be operated on a street, highway, or public vehicular area in excess of 25 miles per hour over the speed limit while fleeing or attempting to elude a law enforcement officer who is in the lawful performance of duties with the blue light flashing. A person violating this subsection shall be guilty of a misdemeanor."
  - Sec. 2. G.S. 20-141(j) reads as rewritten:

- "(j) Any person convicted of violating this section by operating a vehicle on a street or highway in excess of 55 miles per hour and at least 15 miles per hour over the legal limit while fleeing or attempting to elude arrest or apprehension by a law-enforcement officer with authority to enforce the motor vehicle laws and who has the blue light flashing is guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not less than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) nor more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000) or imprisonment for not more than two years, or both, in the discretion of the court."
- Sec. 3. G.S. 20-17 is amended by adding the following new subdivision at the end to read:
  - "(12) Speeding to elude arrest under G.S. 20-141.5."
- Sec. 4. This act becomes effective December 1, 1993, and applies to offenses committed on or after that date. Prosecutions and license revocations based on offenses occurring before the effective date of this act are not abated or affected by this act, and the statutes that would be applicable but for this act remain applicable to those prosecutions or license revocations.
