BILL SUMMARY: Establishes the North Carolina Home Inspector Licensure Board; empowers the Board to adopt criteria for the licensing of Home Inspectors, to administer a licensing program, to impose sanctions for misconduct; sets limits on licensing fees; requires the Department of Insurance to provide clerical and staff services and to enforce rules promulgated by the Board.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Effective upon ratification. However, licensing is not required before March 1, 1995.

ASSUMPTIONS AND METHODOLOGY:

- 1. Based upon the 1993 <u>Assessment Report</u> of the Legislative Committee on New Licensing Boards, it is estimated that 400 home inspectors currently practicing will acquire licenses in FY 94-95 to meet the March 1, 1995 statutory deadline.
- 2. The number of practicing home inspectors will grow by 10% each year through FY 1997-98.

- 3. Application, licensing, and renewal fees will be set at the midpoint of the range permitted on page 6, lines 35-45 of the bill.
- 4. The Licensure Board will meet six times during FY 93-94, and four times during each year thereafter.
- 5. The Licensure Board will spend \$10,000 for technical consulting and other services during FY 93-94 (development phase) and \$5,000 for those services in each year thereafter.
- 6. Impacts upon the judicial and correction systems occasioned by the criminal penalties proposed on page 7, lines 7-14 would be negligible.
