| 6 | consider (i) demographic facts such as the number of students in the school or |
| 7 | community to be served and the incidence of juvenile crime and (ii) the amount needed |
| 8 | to implement the proposal. For the 1994-95 fiscal year, the average amount of each |
| 9 | grant shall be sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000) per year. |
