1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2	AN ACT TO IMPLEMENT THE SUPPORT OUR STUDENTS (S.O.S.) PROGRAM,
3	TO ESTABLISH THE FAMILY RESOURCE CENTER GRANT PROGRAM,
4	AND TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS FOR THESE PROGRAMS.
5	Whereas, the issues of crime and school violence in the State's public schools
6	have been well documented; and
7	Whereas, the General Assembly finds that there is a need to address these
8	issues with a series of immediate strategies and long-term, preventive solutions; and
9	Whereas, each child and each adolescent has interrelated physical,
10	educational, emotional, and social needs, which, if left unmet, may lead to academic
11	failure, future unemployment, or criminal behavior; and
12	Whereas, there is a need in the State for comprehensive and broad-based
13	collaboration and collaborative planning and delivery of services among public and
14	private agencies that serve the needs of children, youth, and families; and
15	Whereas, it is necessary to make more efficient and effective use of existing
16	federal, State, and local resources and programs that serve children, youth, and families;
17	and
18	Whereas, there is a need to enhance the abilities of families to function as
19	nurturing and effective family units; and
20	Whereas, there is a need to provide services to enhance students' academic
21	success and assist children, youth, and families by meeting some of their basic needs at
22	or near schools or by linking families to agencies in their communities; and

1	Whereas, these services, which are part of a long-term school violence	
2	prevention program, must be based on the following four fundamental principles:	
3	(1) Families, schools, and communities must share responsibility in order	
4	to enhance children's abilities to attain academic and social success	
5	and to reduce crime and violence;	
6	(2) Middle school-aged children need well-supervised and enriching	
7	activities that extend beyond the traditional school day and are	
8	designed to enhance self-esteem and improve academic performance.	
9	These activities are powerful, preventive measures for reducing crime	
10	and violence;	
11	(3) Each county must design a focused program based on local needs,	
12	neighborhood-based services, and strong accountability measures; and	
13	(4) In most counties, school buildings may be the primary or only	
14	buildings available for implementing this program; and	
15	Whereas, these programs must rely on a strong corps of community	
16	volunteers who will serve as valuable role models for students and who will connect	
17	with these students at a very special time in their lives; and	
18	Whereas, due to the efforts of the community volunteers, many young people	
19	will come to understand the importance of discipline, and they will be given hope for	
20	the future that may not have been previously present; Now, therefore,	
21	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:	
22	Section 1. Article 16 of Chapter 115C of the General Statutes is amended by

30	provide for comprehensive, collaborative delivery of services by public and nonpublic	
31	agencies to these children and their families. These services shall be designed to enrich	
32	and make a positive impact on the lives of middle school-aged children.

35	(2) Recruit community volunteers to provide positive adult role models for

15	expulsions involving middle school-aged children, (iv) average daily
16	membership of middle school-aged children, (v) the number and
17	percentage of middle school-aged children with two working parents
18	or one single parent, and (vi) any other relevant or unique local
19	demographic data. Only schools that serve middle school-aged
20	children in at least two of the grades six through nine shall be
21	identified;
22	(2) A three-year plan, developed in consultation with the building-level
23	school improvement team, appointed in accordance with G.S. 115C-
24	238.3(b1), of each school whose students may be served by the grant,
25	to address the needs of these students;
26	(3) Goals and anticipated outcomes for initiatives, and a system to
27	measure their success;
28	(4) A list of services to be offered that are related to the goals and
29	anticipated outcomes of the local plans. These services shall include
30	(i) supervision and enrichment activities for middle school-aged
31	children following the regular school day, and (ii) the recruitment of a
32	strong corps of volunteers for involvement in all aspects of the
33	program. The services may include (i) transportation, (ii) parental
34	involvement activities, and (iii) coordinated services offered by local
35	community agencies relative to the needs of middle school-aged
36	children and their families; and
37	(5) A budget including the use of existing resources.
38	(d) Notwithstanding subsection (c) of this section, a local school administrative
39	unit may apply for a grant under this section if its application provides convincing
40	evidence that genuine interagency collaboration was attempted, but failed, in the county
41	in which the school administrative unit is located. In this case, the local school
42	administrative unit shall state in its application any future steps it plans to take to
43	encourage and implement local-level collaboration and coordination of services for
44	middle school-aged children and their families.

21	(b) Local boards of education may, and are encouraged to, use grant funds to
22	contract for services for middle school-aged children. Grant funds shall not be used to
23	provide services for children who are not middle school-aged children. Staffing should
24	include the use of the community schools coordinator employed by the board of
25	education under G.S. 115C-209.

34	Sec. 3. (a) There is appropriated from the General Fund to State Aid to Local School		
35	Administrative Units the sum of ten million dollars (\$10,000,000) for the 1994-95 fiscal		
36	year to implement Section 1 of this act. Of these funds, a maximum of two hundred		
37	thousand dollars (\$200,000) may be used by the State Board of Education to administer		
38	the S.O.S. Program and to provide technical assistance to applicants and to S.O.S.		
39	centers. For the 1994-95 fiscal year, the State Board of Education shall provide one		
40	grant to each local administrative school unit to establish one or more S.O.S. centers. It		
41	is the goal of the General Assembly that all programs that receive grants for the 1994-95		
42	fiscal year shall be operating at the beginning of the 1994-95 school year. In no case		
43	shall the implementation of these programs begin later than January 31, 1995.		

1	(b) Ther	e is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Human
2	Resources the	sum of four million one hundred seventy-five thousand dollars
3	(\$4,175,000) fo	or the 1994-95 fiscal year to implement Section 2 of this act.
4	Of th	lese funds:
5	(1)	\$100,000 shall be used by the Department of Human Resources for
6		training, materials, and consultation services.
7	(2)	\$3,750,000 shall be used for grants for up to \$37,500 per county to
8		begin implementation of the family resource center grants established
9		in Section 2 of this act. The grants shall be awarded for the six months
10		beginning January 1, 1995. These grants shall be based on the
11		guidelines established under Section 2 of this act.
12	(3)	\$325,000 shall be used by the Division of Family Development,
13		Department of Human Resources, to administer the program and to
14		provide technical assistance to applicants and to family resource
15		centers.
16	(c) The	State Board of Education may use funds available in State Aid to Local
17	School Admin	istrative Units to carry out the work of the Grant Review Committee
18	established in S	Section 1 of this act before July 1, 1994.
19	Sec.	4. Subsections (a) and (b) of Section 3 of this act become effective July
20	1, 1994. The re	emainder of this act is effective upon ratification.

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
