1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2	AN ACT TO MAKE VARIOUS CHANGES IN THE MARINE FISHERIES LAWS
3	AND TO CREATE A SCIENTIFIC ADVISORY COUNCIL.
4	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
5	Section 1. (a) G.S. 113-154(c1) reads as rewritten:
6	"(c1) A shellfish leaseholder under G.S. 113-202, or a water column leaseholder
7	under G.S. 113-202.1 or G.S. 113-202.2-G.S. 113-202.2, or a franchise holder under G.S.
8	113-206 who purchases an individual shellfish license under this section, may utilize up to
9	two additional persons to take shellfish from the leaseholder's lease without purchasing
10	additional individual shellfish licenses. The leaseholder shall be on the premises supervising the
11	person or persons, and the person or persons shall be restricted to taking shellfish only from the
12	leaseholder's lease employ persons who do not possess individual shellfish licenses,
13	provided that the employees have written proof of employment on hand, if requested for
14	inspection by a Marine Fisheries officer to verify lawful activities on the lease. The
15	written proof of employment shall include: (i) the name and address of the leaseholder or
16	franchise holder; (ii) the lease or franchise number; (iii) the date of issuance and

1	expiration of the lease or franchise; and (iv) the employee's name and address. The proof		
2	of employment shall be signed and dated by the leaseholder or franchise holder."		
3	(b) Section 3 of Chapter 547 of the 1995 Session Laws (1996 Regular Session) is		
4	amended by deleting the phrase "Carteret County" and by substituting the phrase "Core		
5	Sound".		
6	Sec. 2. Article 15 of Chapter 113 of the General Statutes is amended by		
7	adding a new section to read:		
8	" <u>§ 113-190. Fishery Resource Grant Program.</u>		
9	(a) <u>Creation. – There is created within the Sea Grant College Program at The</u>		
10	University of North Carolina, the Fishery Resource Grant Program. The purpose of the		
11	program is to work within priorities established by the Marine Fisheries Commission to		
12	protect and enhance the State's coastal fishery resources through individual grants in the		
13	following areas:		
14	(1) <u>New fisheries equipment or gear;</u>		
15	(2) Environmental pilot studies, including water quality and fisheries

17	(3) <u>Aquaculture or mariculture of marine dependent species; or</u>		
18	(4) <u>Seafood technology.</u> (b) <u>Arruph Establishment of Priorities</u> The Commission shall in accommission		
19 20	(b) Annual Establishment of Priorities. – The Commission shall, in cooperation		
20 21	with fishermen, the Division of Marine Fisheries, and the Sea Grant College Program,		
21	establish priorities effective July 1 of each year for the grant program. The adoption of priorities by the Commission shall not be considered rule making within the meaning of		
22	the Administrative Procedure Act. The Commission shall provide public notice of its		
23 24	proposed priorities at least 30 days before the Commission meeting prior to a final		
24 25	determination of its priorities for the fiscal year.		
23 26	(c) Procedure to Solicit Proposals. – Following the establishment of priorities by		
20 27	the Commission, Sea Grant shall hold workshops within each of the coastal regions to		
28	solicit applications and to assist persons involved in fishing industries in writing		
29	proposals. For purposes of this act, the term 'fishing industry' includes persons involved		
30	in: (i) commercial or recreational fishing; (ii) aquaculture or mariculture; or (iii) handling		
31	fish products such as seafood dealers or processors. Sea Grant shall encourage		
32	preproposal conferences between individuals in the fisheries industry and those with		
33	technical or research background to work as partners in developing and writing the		
34	proposals and in writing final report results. If the grants approved by the Commission		
35	do not utilize all available funds, Sea Grant may advertise and solicit additional		
36	applications during the applicable fiscal year.		
37	(d) Application for Grant Program. – An applicant may apply for grant funds to		
38	the Sea Grant College Program. For purposes of this subsection, every proposal shall		
39	include substantial involvement of active North Carolina persons involved in a fishing		
40	industry. A proposal generated by a person not involved in a fishing industry may be		
41	eligible for funding only if the proposal includes written endorsements supporting the		
42	project from persons or organizations representing fishing industries. An application		
43	shall include, but not be limited to, the following:		

1	(1) Name and address of the primary applicant;
2	(2) List of licenses issued to the applicant by the State of North Carolina;
3	(3) <u>A description of the project:</u>
4	(4) <u>A detailed statement of the projected costs of the project including the</u>
5	cost to plan and design the project;
6	(5) <u>An explanation of how the project will enhance the fishery resource;</u>
7	(6) List of names and addresses of any other persons who will participate in
8	the project; and
9	(7) Any other information necessary to make a recommendation on the
10	application.
11	(e) <u>Review Process. – Sea Grant shall conduct an anonymous peer review of all</u>
12	applications for fisheries grants. At least one of the peer reviewers shall be a person
13	involved in a fishing industry. Applications shall be confidential and shall not be defined
14	as a public record as defined under G.S. 132-1 until after the closing date for submission
15	of applications. Following the review of all proposals, Sea Grant shall rank proposals in
16	order of priority and shall present the recommendations to the Commission. Any
17	criterion used by Sea Grant in ranking proposals shall not require rule making within the
18	meaning of the Administrative Procedure Act, but such criteria shall be public records as
19	defined in G.S. 132-1.
20	(f) <u>Award Process. – The Commission shall review the ranking of proposals, and</u>
21	if consistent with the priority rankings established under subsection (e) of this section,
22	shall fund those proposals. Applications that include involvement by fishermen in the
23	project shall be accorded a priority in funding by the Commission. Following approval
24	by the Commission, the Sea Grant College Program shall award the grants. To the extent
25	practicable, the Sea Grant College Program shall distribute grant funding among the
26	northern, southern, central, and Pamlico coastal regions.
27	(g) <u>Restrictions on Grants. – No member of the Commission may benefit</u>
28	financially from a grant. If a grant recipient from a prior year has failed to perform a
29 20	grant project to the satisfaction of the Sea Grant College Program or the Commission, the
30	Sea Grant College Program may decline to fund any new application involving the
31	principal applicant.
32	(h) Grant Reports and Funding. – Grant recipients shall provide quarterly progress
33	reports to the Sea Grant College Program and shall submit invoices for expenditures for
34 25	each quarter. Twenty-five percent (25%) of the total grant award shall be held until the grant register that a similar the grant register that a similar the project and submitted a final written report. The

This report shall include a summary of all fish kill activity 7 within the last year, an overview of any trend analyses, a discussion of any new or 8 modified methodologies or reporting protocols, and any other relevant information. 9 Sec. 5. Funds appropriated to the Department of Environment, Health, and 10 Natural Resources for the Fishery Resource Grant Program under Section 2 of Chapter 324 of the 1994 Session Laws shall be transferred to the Board of Governors of The 11 12 University of North Carolina for the Sea Grant College Program to administer the Fishery Resource Grant Program. The Sea Grant College Program may use up to twenty-five 13 14 thousand dollars (\$25,000) for administrative expenses relating to the Fishery Resource 15 Grant Program. 16 Sec. 6. Notwithstanding subsection (b) of Section 2 of this act, the Marine 17 Fisheries Commission may establish priorities by September 1, 1996, for the 1996-97 18 fiscal year. 19 Sec. 7. (a) The Marine Fisheries Commission may adopt temporary rules to 20 establish recreational bag and size limits for bluefish, striped bass, and weakfish to 21 comply with conservation equivalencies allowed under fisheries management plans adopted by the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission. The Marine Fisheries 22 23 Commission may adopt temporary rules to correct an omission concerning bag limits for 24 spotted sea trout. 25 (b)The Marine Fisheries Commission may adopt temporary rules to change the closure days for shrimping. 26 27 Sec. 8. This act constitutes a recent act of the General Assembly within the meaning of G.S. 150B-21.1. The Marine Fisheries Commission may adopt temporary 28 29 rules to implement this act. 30 Sec. 9. This act is effective upon ratification.
