A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

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AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE THE LEGISLATIVE RESEARCH COMMISSION TO STUDY STATE PURCHASING.

Whereas, the Legislative Research Commission authorized a study of State purchasing following the 1993 session of the General Assembly; and

Whereas, the committee authorized to study the issue appointed a subcommittee to review the issues and prepare a legislative response; and

Whereas, the subcommittee has prepared draft legislation in response to the issues but feels that additional time is necessary to review substantive issues in the draft, to see the impact of GATT and NAFTA on purchasing, to review the results of the State procurement disparity study, to study the GPAC purchasing recommendations in more depth, and to circulate the final draft to using agencies for reaction and comments; and

Whereas, it is the intent of the committee that its work to date be preserved and that the General Assembly resume the study of purchasing and correction enterprises after the 1995 long session and report on an expedited basis to the General Assembly with legislation for the 1996 session; Now therefore,

Sec. 3. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the General Assembly
the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) for fiscal year 1995-96 to be allocated to
