1 A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2 AN ACT TO AMEND THE PSYCHOLOGY PRACTICE ACT AND RELATED
3 STATUTES.

4 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

5 Section 1. G.S. 90-270.2 is amended by inserting a new subdivision after
6 subdivision (7) to read:

7 "(7a) Licensed psychologist-masters. – An individual holding a masters or
8 specialist degree in psychology to whom a license has been issued
9 pursuant to the provisions of this Article, whose license is in force and
10 not suspended or revoked, and whose license permits him or her to
11 engage in the practice of psychology as defined in this Article."

12 Sec. 2. G.S. 90-270.3 reads as rewritten:

13 **"§ 90-270.3. Practice of medicine and optometry not permitted.**

14 Nothing in this Article shall be construed as permitting licensed psychologists,
15 licensed psychologist-masters, or licensed psychological associates to engage in any
16 manner in all or any of the parts of the practice of medicine or optometry licensed under
17 Articles 1 and 6 of Chapter 90 of the General Statutes, including, among others, the
18 diagnosis and correction of visual and muscular anomalies of the human eyes and visual
19 apparatus, eye exercises, orthoptics, vision training, visual training and developmental

1 vision. A licensed psychologist, licensed psychologist-masters, or licensed psychological
2 associate shall assist his or her client or patient in obtaining professional help for all
3 aspects of the client's or patient's problems that fall outside the boundaries of the
4 psychologist's own competence, including provision for the diagnosis and treatment of
5 relevant medical or optometric problems."

6 Sec. 3. G.S. 90-270.4(c) reads as rewritten:

7 "(c) Persons certified by the State Board of Education as school psychologists and
8 serving as regular salaried employees of the Department of Public Instruction or local
9 boards of education are not required to be licensed under this Article in order to perform
10 the duties for which they serve the Department of Public Instruction or local boards of
11 education, and nothing in this Article shall be construed as limiting their activities,
12 services, or titles while performing those duties for which they serve the Department of
13 Public Instruction or local boards of education. If a person certified by the State Board of
14 Education as a school psychologist and serving as a regular salaried employee of the
15 Department of Public Instruction or a local board of education is or becomes a licensed
16 psychologist or licensed psychologist-masters under this Article, he or she shall be
17 required to comply with all conditions, requirements, and obligations imposed by statute
18 or by Board rules upon all other licensed psychologists or licensed psychologist-masters
19 as a condition to retaining that license. Other provisions of this Article notwithstanding, if
20 a person certified by the State Board of Education as a school psychologist and serving as
21 a regular salaried employee of the Department of Public Instruction or a local board of
22 education is or becomes a licensed psychological associate under this Article, he or she
23 shall not be required to comply with the supervision requirements otherwise applicable to
24 licensed psychological associates by Board rules or by this Article in the course of his or
25 her regular salaried employment with the Department of Public Instruction or a local
26 board of education, but he or she shall be required to comply with all other conditions,
27 requirements, and obligations imposed by statute or a local board of education or by
28 Board rules upon all other licensed psychological associates as a condition to retaining
29 that license."

30 Sec. 4. G.S. 90-270.4(d) reads as rewritten:

31 "(d) Nothing in this Article shall be construed as limiting the activities, services,
32 and use of title designating training status of a student, intern, fellow, or other trainee
33 preparing for the practice of psychology under the supervision and responsibility of a
34 qualified psychologist in an institution of higher education or service facility, provided
35 that such activities and services constitute a part of his course of or her course of study as
36 a matriculated graduate student in psychology. For individuals pursuing postdoctoral or
37 post-masters training or experience in psychology, nothing shall limit the use of a title
38 designating training status, but the Board may develop rules defining qualified
39 supervision, disclosure of supervisory relationships, frequency of supervision, settings to
40 which trainees may be assigned, activities in which trainees may engage, qualifications
41 for trainee status, nature of responsibility assumed by the supervisor, and the structure,
42 content, and organization of postdoctoral or post-masters experience."

43 Sec. 5. G.S. 90-270.5 reads as rewritten:

1 **"§ 90-270.5. Application; examination; supervision; provisional and temporary**
2 **licenses.**

3 (a) Except as otherwise exempted by G.S. 90-270.4, persons who are qualified by
4 education to practice psychology in this State must make application for licensure to the
5 Board within 30 days of offering to practice or undertaking the practice of psychology in
6 North Carolina. Applications must then be completed for review by the Board within the
7 time period stipulated in the duly adopted rules of the Board. Persons who practice or
8 offer to practice psychology for more than 30 days without making application for
9 licensure, who fail to complete the application process within the time period specified by
10 the Board, or who are denied licensure pursuant to G.S. 90-270.11 or G.S. 90-270.15,
11 may not subsequently practice or offer to practice psychology without first becoming
12 licensed.

13 (b) After making application for licensure, applicants must take the first
14 examination to which they are admitted by the Board. If applicants fail the examination,
15 they may continue to practice psychology until they take the next examination to which
16 they are admitted by the Board. If applicants fail the second examination, they shall
17 cease the practice of psychology per G.S. 90-270.4(h), and may not subsequently practice
18 or offer to practice psychology without first reapplying for and receiving a license from
19 the Board. An applicant who does not take an examination on the date prescribed by the
20 Board shall be deemed to have failed that examination.

21 (c) All individuals who have yet to apply and who are practicing or offering to
22 practice psychology in North Carolina, and all applicants who are practicing or offering
23 to practice psychology in North Carolina, shall at all times comply with supervision
24 requirements established by the Board. The Board shall specify in its rules the format,
25 setting, content, time frame, amounts of supervision, qualifications of supervisors,
26 disclosure of supervisory relationships, the organization of the supervised experience, and
27 the nature of the responsibility assumed by the supervisor. Individuals shall be
28 supervised for all activities comprising the practice of psychology until they have met the
29 following conditions:

30 (1) For licensed psychologist applicants, until they have passed the
31 examination to which they have been admitted by the Board, have been
32 notified of the results, have completed supervision requirements
33 specified in subsection (d) of this section, and have been informed by
34 the Board of permanent licensure as a licensed psychologist; or

35 (2) For licensed psychological associate applicants, until they have passed
36 the examination to which they have been admitted by the Board, have
37 been notified of the results, and have been informed by the Board of
38 permanent licensure as a licensed psychological associate, after which
39 time supervision is required only for those activities specified in
40 subsection (e) of this section.

41 (3) For licensed psychologist-masters applicants, until they have passed the
42 examination to which they have been admitted by the Board, have been
43 notified of the results, have completed supervision requirements

1 specified in subsection (e1) of this section, and have been informed by
2 the Board of permanent licensure as a licensed psychologist-masters.

3 (d) For permanent licensure as a licensed psychologist, an otherwise qualified
4 psychologist must secure two years of acceptable and appropriate supervised experience
5 germane to his or her training and intended area of practice as a psychologist. The Board
6 shall permit such supervised experience to be acquired on a less than full-time basis, and
7 shall additionally specify in its rules the format, setting, content, time frame, amounts of
8 supervision, qualifications of supervisors, disclosure of supervisory relationships, the
9 organization of the supervised experience, and the nature of the responsibility assumed
10 by the supervisor. Supervision of health services must be received from qualified
11 licensed psychologists holding health services provider certificates, or from other
12 psychologists recognized by the Board in accordance with Board rules.

13 (1) One of these years of experience shall be postdoctoral, and for this year,
14 the Board may require, as specified in its rules, that the supervised
15 experience be comparable to the knowledge and skills acquired during
16 formal doctoral or postdoctoral education, in accordance with
17 established professional standards.

18 (2) One of these years may be predoctoral and the Board shall establish
19 rules governing appropriate supervised predoctoral experience.

20 (3) A psychologist who meets all other requirements of G.S. 90-270.11(a)
21 as a licensed psychologist, except the two years of supervised
22 experience, may be issued a provisional license by the Board for the
23 practice of psychology. If the psychologist terminates the supervised
24 experience before the completion of two years, the Board may place the
25 psychologist on inactive status, during which time supervision will not
26 be required, and the practice of psychology or the offer to practice
27 psychology is prohibited. In the event a licensed psychologist issued a
28 provisional license under this subsection is placed on inactive status or
29 is completing the supervised experience on a part-time basis, the Board
30 may renew the provisional license as necessary until such time as the
31 psychologist has completed the equivalent of two years' supervised
32 experience.

33 (e) A licensed psychological associate shall be supervised by a qualified licensed
34 psychologist, or other qualified professionals, in accordance with Board rules specifying
35 the format, setting, content, time frame, amounts of supervision, qualifications of
36 supervisors, disclosure of supervisory relationships, the organization of the supervised
37 experience, and the nature of the responsibility assumed by the supervisor. A licensed
38 psychological associate who provides health services shall be supervised, for those
39 activities requiring supervision, by a qualified licensed psychologist holding health
40 services provider certification or by other qualified professionals under the overall
41 direction of a qualified licensed psychologist holding health services provider
42 certification, in accordance with Board rules. Except as provided below, supervision,
43 including the supervision of health services, is required only when a licensed

1 psychological associate engages in: assessment of personality functioning;
2 neuropsychological evaluation; psychotherapy, counseling, and other interventions with
3 clinical populations for the purpose of preventing or eliminating symptomatic,
4 maladaptive, or undesired behavior; and, the use of intrusive, punitive, or experimental
5 procedures, techniques, or measures. The Board shall adopt rules implementing and
6 defining this provision, and as the practice of psychology evolves, may identify
7 additional activities requiring supervision in order to maintain acceptable standards of
8 practice.

9 (e1) For permanent licensure as a licensed psychologist-masters, an otherwise
10 qualified psychologist holding a masters or specialist degree (M.A., M.S., or Ed.S.) must
11 secure four years of acceptable and appropriate supervised experience germane to his or
12 her training and intended area of practice as a psychologist. The Board shall permit such
13 supervised experience to be acquired on a less than full-time basis, and shall additionally
14 specify in its rules the format, setting, content, time frame, amounts of supervision,
15 qualifications of supervisors, disclosure of supervisory relationships, the organization of
16 the supervision experience, and the nature of the responsibility assumed by the
17 supervisor. Supervision of health services must be received from qualified licensed
18 psychologists holding health services provider certificates, or from other psychologists
19 authorized by the Board in accordance with Board rules. All four years of supervised
20 experience must be acquired following completion of the masters degree, and graduate
21 internships will not count towards meeting this supervision requirement.

22 (f) A nonresident psychologist who is either licensed or certified by a similar
23 Board in another jurisdiction whose standards, in the opinion of the Board, are, at the date
24 of his or her certification or licensure, substantially equivalent to or higher than the
25 requirements of this Article, may be issued a temporary license by the Board for the
26 practice of psychology in this State for a period not to exceed the aggregate of 30 days in
27 any calendar year. The Board may issue temporary health services provider certification
28 simultaneously if the nonresident psychologist can demonstrate two years of acceptable
29 supervised health services experience. All temporarily licensed psychologists shall
30 comply with supervision requirements established by the Board.

31 (g) An applicant for reinstatement of licensure, whose license was suspended
32 under G.S. 90-270.15(f), may be issued a temporary license and temporary health
33 services provider certification in accordance with the duly adopted rules of the Board."

34 Sec. 6. G.S. 90-270.6 reads as rewritten:

35 **"§ 90-270.6. Psychology Board; appointment; term of office; composition.**

36 For the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this Article, there is created a North
37 Carolina Psychology Board, which shall consist of ~~seven~~nine members appointed by the
38 Governor. At all times three members shall be licensed ~~psychologists, psychologists with~~
39 ~~a doctorate degree in psychology,~~ two~~three~~ members shall be licensed ~~psychological~~
40 ~~associates, psychologist-masters or licensed psychological associates,~~ and ~~two~~three
41 members shall be members of the public who are not licensed under this Article. Each
42 member of the Board must reside in a different congressional district at the time of the
43 appointment. Due consideration shall also be given to the adequate representation of the

1 various fields and areas of practice of psychology. Terms of office shall be three years.
2 All terms of service on the Board expire June 30 in appropriate years. As the term of a
3 licensed psychologist member with a doctorate degree in psychology expires, or as a
4 ~~vacancy of a psychologist member occurs in that category~~ for any other reason, the North
5 ~~Carolina Psychological Association, or its successor, Association~~ shall, having sought the
6 advice of the chairs of the graduate departments of psychology in the State, for each
7 vacancy, submit to the Governor a list of the names of three eligible ~~persons~~ persons for
8 each vacancy. As the term of a licensed psychologist-masters or licensed psychological
9 associate expires or as a vacancy occurs in that category for any other reason, the
10 professional psychological organization representing the largest number of licensed
11 psychologist-masters and licensed psychological associates in North Carolina shall,
12 having sought the advice of the chairs of the graduate departments of psychology in the
13 State for each vacancy, submit to the Governor a list of the names of three eligible
14 persons for each vacancy. From ~~appointment~~ these appointments, each for a full term, or
15 for the remainder of the unexpired term, if any. Each Board member shall serve until his
16 or her successor has been appointed. As the term of a member expires, or if one should
17 become vacant for any reason, the Governor shall appoint a new member within 60 days
18 of the vacancy's occurring. No member, either public or licensed under this Article, shall
19 serve more than three complete consecutive terms."

20 Sec. 6.1. G.S. 90-270.7(a) reads as rewritten:

21 "(a) Each licensed ~~psychologist~~ psychologist, licensed psychologist-masters, and
22 licensed psychological associate member of the Board shall have the following
23 qualifications:

- 24 (1) Shall be a resident of this State and a citizen of the United States;
- 25 (2) Shall be at the time of appointment and shall have been for at least five
26 years prior thereto, actively engaged in one or more branches of
27 psychology or in the education and training of master's, specialist,
28 doctoral, or postdoctoral students of psychology or in psychological
29 research, and such activity during the two years preceding appointment
30 shall have occurred primarily in this State.
- 31 (3) Shall be free of conflict of interest in performing the duties of the
32 Board."

33 Sec. 7. G.S. 90-270.10 reads as rewritten:

34 **"§ 90-270.10. Annual report.**

35 On June 30 of each year, the Board shall submit a report to the Governor of the
36 Board's activities since the preceding July 1, including the names of all licensed
37 ~~psychologists and psychologists, licensed psychological associates~~ psychologist-masters, and
38 licensed psychological associates to whom licenses have been granted under this Article,
39 any cases heard and decisions rendered in matters before the Board, the recommendations
40 of the Board as to future actions and policies, and a financial report. Each member of the
41 Board shall review and sign the report before its submission to the Governor. Any Board
42 member shall have the right to record a dissenting view."

43 Sec. 8. G.S. 90-270.11 reads as rewritten:

1 **"§ 90-270.11. Licensure; examination; foreign graduates.**

2 (a) Licensed Psychologist. – The Board shall issue a permanent license to practice
3 psychology to any applicant who pays an application fee and any applicable examination
4 fee as specified in G.S. 90-270.18(b), who who passes an examination in psychology as
5 prescribed by the Board, and who submits evidence verified by oath and satisfactory to
6 the Board that he or she:

7 (1) Is at least 18 years of age;

8 (2) Is of good moral character;

9 (3) Has received a doctoral degree based on a planned and directed program
10 of studies in psychology from an institution of higher education. The
11 degree program, wherever administratively housed, must be publicly
12 identified and clearly labeled as a psychology program. The Board shall
13 adopt rules implementing and defining these provisions, including, but
14 not limited to, such factors as residence in the educational program,
15 internship and related field experiences, number of course credits,
16 course content, numbers and qualifications of faculty, and program
17 identification and identity.

18 (4) Has had at least two years of acceptable and appropriate supervised
19 experience germane to his or her training and intended area of practice
20 as a psychologist as specified in G.S. 90-270.5(d).

21 (a1) Licensed Psychologist-Masters. – The Board shall issue a permanent license to
22 practice psychology to any applicant who pays an application fee and any applicable
23 examination fee as specified in G.S. 90-270.18(b), who passes an examination in
24 psychology as prescribed by the Board, and who submits evidence verified by oath and
25 satisfactory to the Board that he or she:

26 (1) Is at least 18 years of age;

27 (2) Is of good moral character;

28 (3) Has received a masters or specialist degree based on a planned and
29 directed program of studies in psychology from an institution of higher
30 education. The degree program, wherever administratively housed, must
31 be publicly identified and clearly labeled as a psychology program. The
32 Board shall adopt rules implementing and defining these provisions,
33 including, but not limited to, such factors as residence in the educational
34 program, internship and related field experiences, number of course
35 credits, course content, numbers and qualifications of faculty, and
36 program identification and identity;

37 (4) Has had at least four years of acceptable and appropriate supervised
38 experience germane to his or her training and intended area of practice
39 as a psychologist as specified in G.S. 90-270.5(e);

40 (5) Has passed the national examination in psychology at the licensed
41 psychologist passing point.

42 Notwithstanding the provisions of this subsection, the Board shall adopt rules
43 implementing a transition provision whereby any licensed psychological associate in

1 good standing may apply for a license to practice psychology as a licensed psychologist-
2 masters (M.A., M.S., or Ed. S.) if application for such is made to the Board by June 30,
3 1996. These rules shall define criteria, including, but not limited to, combinations of
4 graduate course work and years of experience that shall be deemed satisfactory to meet
5 all requirements for licensure as a licensed psychologist-masters.

6 (b) Licensed Psychological Associate. –

7 (1) The Board shall issue a permanent license to practice psychology to any
8 applicant who pays an application fee and any applicable examination
9 fee as specified in G.S. 90-270.18(b), who passes an examination in
10 psychology as prescribed by the Board, and who submits evidence
11 verified by oath and satisfactory to the Board that he or she:

12 a. Is at least 18 years of age;

13 b. Is of good moral character;

14 c. Has received a master's degree in psychology or a specialist
15 degree in psychology from an institution of higher education.
16 The degree program, wherever administratively housed, must be
17 publicly identified and clearly labeled as a psychology program.
18 The Board shall adopt rules implementing and defining these
19 provisions, including, but not limited to, such factors as residence
20 in the program, internship and related field experiences, number
21 of course credits, course content, numbers and qualifications of
22 faculty, and program identification and identity.

23 (2) Notwithstanding the provisions of this subsection, a licensed
24 psychologist applicant who has met all requirements for licensure
25 except passing the examination at the licensed psychologist level, may
26 be issued a license as a licensed psychological associate without having
27 a master's degree or specialist degree in psychology if the applicant
28 passes the examination at the licensed psychological associate level.

29 (c) Foreign Graduates. – Applicants trained in institutions outside the United
30 States, applying for licensure at either the licensed psychologist or licensed ~~psychological~~
31 ~~associate~~ psychologist-masters or licensed psychological associate level, must show
32 satisfactory evidence of training and degrees substantially equivalent to those required of
33 applicants trained within the United States, pursuant to Board rules and regulations.

34 (d) Prior Licensure. – A person who is licensed in good standing as a licensed
35 practicing psychologist or psychological associate under the provisions of the Practicing
36 Psychologist Licensing Act in effect immediately prior to the ratification of this
37 Psychology Practice Act shall be deemed, as of October 1, 1993 to have met all
38 requirements for licensure under this act and shall be eligible for renewal of licensure in
39 accordance with the provisions of this act."

40 Sec. 9. G.S. 90-270.15(a)(9) reads as rewritten:

41 "(9) For a licensed ~~psychologist~~, psychologist or psychologist-masters, has
42 provided health services without health services provider certification;".

43 Sec. 10. G.S. 90-270.16(a) reads as rewritten:

1 "(a) Except as permitted in G.S. 90-270.4 and G.S. 90-270.5, it shall be a violation
2 of this Article for any person not licensed in accordance with the provisions of this
3 Article to represent himself or herself as a psychologist, licensed psychologist, licensed
4 psychological associate, licensed psychologist-masters, or health services provider in
5 psychology."

6 Sec. 11. G.S. 90-270.18(b) reads as rewritten:

7 "(b) Fees for activities specified by this Article are as follows:

- 8 (1) Application fees for licensed ~~psychologists and~~ psychologists, licensed
9 ~~psychological associates~~ psychologist-masters, and licensed psychological
10 associates per G.S. 90-270.11(a) and (b)(1), or G.S. 90-270.13, shall not
11 exceed one hundred dollars (\$100.00).
12 (2) Fees for the national written examination shall be the cost of the
13 examination to the Board plus an additional fee not to exceed fifty
14 dollars (\$50.00).
15 (3) Fees for additional examinations shall be as prescribed by the Board.
16 (4) Fees for the renewal of licenses, per G.S. 90-270.14(a)(1), shall not
17 exceed two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) per biennium. This fee may
18 not be prorated.
19 (5) Late fees for license renewal, per G.S. 90-270.14(a)(1), shall be twenty-
20 five dollars (\$25.00).
21 (6) Fees for the reinstatement of a license, per G.S. 90-270.15(f), shall not
22 exceed one hundred dollars (\$100.00).
23 (7) Fees for a duplicate license, per G.S. 90-270.14(b), shall be twenty-five
24 dollars (\$25.00).
25 (8) Fees for a temporary license, per G.S. 90-270.5(f) and 90-270.5(g), shall
26 be twenty-five dollars (\$25.00).
27 (9) Application fees for a health services provider certificate, per G.S. 90-
28 270.20, shall be fifty dollars (\$50.00)."

29 Sec. 12. G.S. 90-270.20 reads as rewritten:

30 **"§ 90-270.20. Provision of health services; certification as health services provider.**

31 (a) Health services, as defined in G.S. 90-270.2(4) and G.S. 90-270.2(8), may be
32 provided by qualified licensed psychological associates, qualified licensed psychologist-
33 masters, qualified licensed psychologists holding provisional, temporary, or permanent
34 licenses, or qualified applicants. Qualified licensed psychological associates, qualified
35 licensed psychologist-masters holding temporary licenses, qualified licensed
36 psychologists holding provisional or temporary licenses, or qualified applicants may
37 provide health services only under supervision as specified in the duly adopted rules of
38 the Board.

39 (b) After January 1, 1995, any licensed psychologist who is qualified by education,
40 who holds permanent licensure and a doctoral degree, and who provides or offers to
41 provide health services to the public must be certified as a health services provider
42 psychologist (HSP-P) by the Board. The Board shall certify as health services provider
43 psychologists those applicants who shall demonstrate at least two years of acceptable

1 supervised health services experience, of which at least one year is postdoctoral. The
2 Board shall specify the format, setting, content, and organization of the supervised health
3 services experience or program. The Board may, upon verification of supervised
4 experience and the meeting of all requirements as a licensed psychologist, issue the
5 license and certificate simultaneously. An application fee, as specified in G.S. 90-
6 270.18(b)(9), must be paid.

7 (b1) After June 30, 1996, any licensed psychologist-masters who is qualified by
8 education, who holds permanent licensure and a masters or specialist degree, and who
9 provides or offers to provide health services to the public must be certified as a health
10 services provider psychologist-masters (HSP-PM) by the Board. The Board shall certify
11 as health services providers those applicants who shall demonstrate at least two years of
12 acceptable supervised health services experience, of which all is post-masters. The Board
13 shall specify the format, setting, content, and organization of the supervised health
14 services experience or program. The Board may, upon verification of supervised
15 experience and the meeting of all the requirements as a psychologist-masters, issue the
16 license and certificate simultaneously. An application fee, as specified in G.S. 90-
17 270.18(b)(9), must be paid.

18 (c) After January 1, 1995, any licensed psychological associate who is qualified by
19 education may be granted certification as a health services provider psychological
20 associate (HSP-PA). The Board may, upon verification of qualifications and the meeting
21 of all requirements as a licensed psychological associate, issue the license and certificate
22 simultaneously. An application fee, as specified in G.S. 90-270.18(b)(9), must be paid.

23 (d) After January 1, 1995, any licensed psychologist holding a provisional license
24 who is qualified by education may be granted certification as a health services provider
25 psychologist (provisional) (HSP-PP) by the Board. The Board may, upon verification of
26 qualifications and the meeting of all requirements for a provisional license, issue the
27 license and certificate simultaneously. An application fee, as specified in G.S. 90-
28 270.18(b)(9), must be paid.

29 ~~(e) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (b) of this section, if application~~
30 ~~is made to the Board before June 30, 1994, by a licensed psychologist who is listed in the~~
31 ~~National Register of Health Services Providers in Psychology, or who holds permanent~~
32 ~~licensure and who can demonstrate that he or she has been engaged acceptably in the~~
33 ~~provision of health services for two years or its equivalent, that licensed psychologist~~
