4	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:				
5		Section	on 1. G.S. 20-140.1(b) reads as rewritten:		
6	"(b)	(b) The provisions of subsection (a) of this section do not apply to the following:			
7		(1)	A police car;		
8		(2)	A highway patrol car;		
9		(3)	A vehicle owned by the Wildlife Resources Commission and operated		
10			exclusively for law-enforcement purposes;		
11		(4)	An ambulance;		
12		(5)	A vehicle used by an organ procurement organization or agency for the		
13			recovery and transportation of human tissues and organs-blood, human		
14			tissues, or organs for transplantation;		
15		(6)	A fire-fighting vehicle;		
16		(7)	A school bus;		
17		(8)	A vehicle operated by any member of a municipal or rural fire		
18			department in the performance of his duties, regardless of whether		
19			members of that fire department are paid or voluntary;		

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1	(9)	A vehicle of a voluntary lifesaving organization (including the private
2		vehicles of the members of such an organization) that has been officially
3		approved by the local police authorities and which is manned or
4		operated by members of that organization while answering an official
5		call;
6	(10)	A vehicle operated by medical doctors or anesthetists in emergencies;
7	(11)	A motor vehicle used in law enforcement by the sheriff, or any salaried
8		rural policeman in any county, regardless of whether or not the county
9		owns the vehicle;
10	(11a)	A vehicle operated by the State Fire Marshal or his representatives in
11		the performance of their duties, whether or not the State owns the
12		vehicle;
13	(12)	A vehicle operated by any county fire marshal, assistant fire marshal, or
14		emergency management coordinator in the performance of his duties,
15		regardless of whether or not the county owns the vehicle;
16	(13)	Any lights that may be prescribed by the Interstate Commerce
17		Commission;
18	(14)	A vehicle operated by a transplant coordinator who is an employee of an
19		organ procurement organization or agency when the transplant
20		coordinator is responding to a call to recover or transport human tissues
21		or organs for transplantation;
22	(15)	A vehicle operated by an emergency medical service as an emergency
23		support vehicle; and
24	(16)	A State emergency management vehicle."
