A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO RETURN THE FOOD STAMP FRAUD FELONY THRESHOLD TO ITS PRE-1991 LIMIT.

- 4 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
 - Section 1. G.S. 108A-53(a) reads as rewritten:

6 Any person, whether provider or recipient or person representing himself as "(a) such, who knowingly obtains or attempts to obtain, or aids or abets any person to obtain 7 by means of making a willfully false statement or representation or by impersonation or 8 9 by failing to disclose material facts or in any manner not authorized by this Part or the regulations issued pursuant thereto, transfers with intent to defraud any food stamps or 10 authorization cards to which he is not entitled in the amount of two thousand dollars 11 (\$2,000) four hundred dollars (\$400.00) or less shall be guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor. 12 Whoever knowingly obtains or attempts to obtain, or aids or abets any person to obtain 13 by means of making a willfully false statement or representation or by impersonation or 14 by failing to disclose material facts or in any manner not authorized by this Part or the 15 regulations issued pursuant thereto, transfers with intent to defraud any food stamps or 16 authorization cards to which he is not entitled in an amount more than two thousand dollars 17 (\$2,000) four hundred dollars (\$400.00) shall be guilty of a Class I felony." 18
