FOUR TWO-YEAR TERMS. AND UNITED STATES SENATORS WHO HAVE SERVED TWO SIX-YEAR TERMS.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

Section 1. Article 17 of Chapter 163 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

"§ 163-203. Ballot access for members of Congress who have served multiple terms of office.

- A person who has been elected as a member of the United States House of (a) Representatives for four consecutive terms of office may not appear on the ballot for member of the United States House of Representatives at the next general election except as a write-in candidate under G.S. 163-123.
- A person who has been elected as a member of the United States Senate for two consecutive full terms of office may not appear on the ballot for member of the United States Senate at the next general election except as a write-in candidate under G.S.
