1	(a) Tiers Defined. – An enterprise tier one area is a county whose enterprise factor
2	is one of the 10 highest in the State. An enterprise tier two area is a county whose
3	enterprise factor is one of the next 15 highest in the State. An enterprise tier three area is
4	a county whose enterprise factor is one of the next 25 highest in the State. An enterprise
5	tier four area is a county whose enterprise factor is one of the next 25 highest in the State.
6	An enterprise tier five area is any area that is not in a lower-numbered enterprise tier.
7	(b) Annual Designation. – Each year, on or before December 31, the Secretary of
8	Commerce shall assign to each county in the State an enterprise factor that is the sum of
9	the following:
10	(1) The county's rank in a ranking of counties by average rate of
11	unemployment from lowest to highest, for the preceding three years.
12	(2) The county's rank in a ranking of counties by average per capita income
13	from highest to lowest, for the preceding three years.
14	(3) The county's rank in a ranking of counties by percentage growth in
15	population from highest to lowest.
16	The Secretary of Commerce shall then rank all the counties within the State according
17	to their enterprise factor from highest to lowest, identify all the areas of the State by
18	enterprise tier, and provide this information to the Secretary of Revenue. An enterprise
19 20	tier designation is effective only for the calendar year following the designation.
20	In measuring rates of unemployment and per capita income, the Secretary shall use the latest available data published by a State or federal agency generally recognized as
21	the latest available data published by a State or federal agency generally recognized as
22 23	having expertise concerning the data. In measuring population growth, the Secretary shall use the most recent estimates of population certified by the State Planning Officer.

29	(a) Development Zone Defined. – A development zone is an area comprised of
30	one or more contiguous census tracts and census block groups in the most recent federal
31	decennial census that meets all of the following conditions:
32	(1) It is located in whole or in part in a city with a population of more than
33	5,000 according to the most recent annual population estimates certified
34	by the State Planning Officer.
35	(2) It has a population of 1,000 or more according to the most recent annual
36	population estimates certified by the State Planning Officer.
37	(3) More than twenty percent (20%) of its population is below the poverty
38	level according to the most recent federal decennial census.
39	(b) Designation. – Upon request of a taxpayer or a local government, the Secretary
40	of Commerce shall designate whether an area is a development zone that meets the
41	conditions of subsection (a) of this section. A development zone designation is effective
42	for 48 months following the designation.

6 (a) Type of Business. – A taxpayer is eligible for a credit allowed by G.S. 105-7 129.12 if the real property for which the credit is claimed is used for a central 8 administrative office that creates at least 40 new jobs. A taxpayer is eligible for the other 9 credits allowed by this Article if the taxpayer engages in one of the following types of 10 businesses and the jobs with respect to which a credit is claimed are created in that business, the machinery and equipment with respect to which a credit is claimed are used 11 12 in that business, and the research and development for which a credit is claimed are 13 carried out as part of that business:

(1) Air courier services.

- (2) Central administrative office that creates at least 40 new jobs.

(4) Manufacturing or processing. Manufacturing.

(5) Warehousing or distribution wholesale trade.

Central Administrative Office. - A central administrative office creates at least 19 (a1) 20 40 new jobs if, during the taxable year the taxpayer first uses the property as a central administrative office, if the taxpayer hires at least 40 additional full-time employees to 21 fill new positions at the office. office either in the year the taxpayer first uses the property 22 23 as a central administrative office or in the preceding 24 months while using temporary 24 space for the central administrative office functions during completion of the administrative office property. Jobs transferred from one area in the State to another area 25 26 in the State are not considered new jobs for purposes of this subsection.

Wage Standard. – A taxpayer is eligible for the credit for creating jobs or the 27 (b)credit for worker training if the jobs for which the credit is claimed meet the wage 28 29 standard at the time the taxpayer applies for the credit. A taxpayer is eligible for the credit for investing in machinery and equipment, the credit for research and development, 30 or the credit for investing in real property for a central administrative office if the jobs at 31 32 the location with respect to which the credit is claimed meet the wage standard at the time 33 the taxpayer applies for the credit. Jobs meet the wage standard if they pay an average weekly wage that is at least equal to the applicable percentage times the applicable 34 average weekly wage for the county in which the jobs will be located, as computed by the 35 Secretary of Commerce from data compiled by the Employment Security Commission 36 37 for the most recent period for which data are available. The applicable percentage for 38 jobs located in an enterprise tier one area is one hundred percent (100%). The applicable percentage for all other jobs is one hundred ten percent (110%). The applicable average 39 40 weekly wage is the lowest of the following: (i) the average wage for all insured private employers in the county, (ii) the average wage for all insured private employers in the 41 42 State, and (iii) the average wage for all insured private employers in the county multiplied by the county income/wage adjustment factor. The county income/wage 43

adjustment factor is the county income/wage ratio divided by the State income/wage 1 2 ratio. The county income/wage ratio is average per capita income in the county divided 3 by the annualized average wage for all insured private employers in the county. The State 4 income/wage ratio is the average per capita income in the State divided by the annualized 5 average wage for all insured private employers in the State. 6 Large Investment. – A taxpayer who is otherwise eligible for a tax credit under (b1) this Article becomes eligible for the large investment enhancements provided for credits 7 8 under this Article if the Secretary of Commerce certifies that the taxpayer will purchase 9 or lease, and place in service in connection with the eligible business within a two-year 10 period, at least one hundred fifty million dollars (\$150,000,000) worth of one or more of the following: real property, machinery and equipment, or central administrative office 11 12 property. If the taxpayer fails to make the level of investment certified within this twoyear period, the taxpayer forfeits the large investment enhancements as provided in 13 subsection (d) of this section. 14 15 Worker Training. - A taxpayer is eligible for the tax credit for worker training (e)16 only for training workers who occupy jobs for which the taxpayer is eligible to claim an 17 installment of the credit for creating jobs or which are full-time positions at a location 18 with respect to which the taxpayer is eligible to claim an installment of the credit for 19 investing in machinery and equipment for the taxable year. 20 The credit for worker training is allowed only with respect to employees in positions not classified as exempt under the Fair Labor Standards Act, 29 U.S.C. § 213(a)(1) and 21 for expenditures for training that would be eligible for expenditure or reimbursement 22 23 under the Department of Community Colleges' New and Expanding Industry Program, as 24 determined by guidelines adopted by the State Board of Community Colleges. The credit is not allowed for expenditures that are paid or reimbursed by the New and Expanding 25 Industry Program. To establish eligibility, the taxpayer must obtain as part of the 26 application process under G.S. 105-129.6 the certification of the Department of 27 Community Colleges that the taxpayer's planned worker training would satisfy the 28 29 requirements of this paragraph. A taxpayer shall apply to the Department of Community 30 Colleges for this certification. The application must be on a form provided by the Department of Community Colleges, must provide a detailed plan of the worker training 31 to be provided, and must contain any information required by the Department of 32 33 Community Colleges to determine whether the requirements of this paragraph will be 34 satisfied. If the Department of Community Colleges determines that the planned worker 35 training meets the requirements of this paragraph, the Department of Community 36 Colleges shall issue a certificate describing the location with respect to which the credit is claimed and stating that the planned worker training meets the requirements of this 37 paragraph. The State Board of Community Colleges may adopt rules in accordance with 38 Chapter 150B of the General Statutes that are needed to carry out its responsibilities 39 40 under this paragraph. Forfeiture. - A taxpayer forfeits a credit allowed under this Article if the 41 (d) 42 taxpayer was not eligible for the credit at the time the taxpayer applied for the credit. In

 $\frac{1}{43}$ addition, a taxpayer forfeits a large investment enhancement of a tax credit if the taxpayer

fails to make the level of investment certified by the Secretary of Commerce under 1 subsection (b1) of this section within the required two-year period. A taxpayer that 2 3 forfeits a credit under this Article is liable for all past taxes avoided as a result of the 4 credit plus interest at the rate established under G.S. 105-241.1(i), computed from the 5 date the taxes would have been due if the credit had not been allowed. The past taxes and 6 interest are due 30 days after the date the credit is forfeited; a taxpayer that fails to pay 7 the past taxes and interest by the due date is subject to the penalties provided in G.S. 105-236. If a taxpayer forfeits the credit for creating jobs or the credit for investing in 8 9 machinery and equipment, the taxpayer also forfeits any credit for worker training 10 claimed for the jobs for which the credit for creating jobs was claimed or the jobs at the location with respect to which the credit for investing in machinery and equipment was 11 12 claimed. 13 Change in Ownership of Business. - The sale, merger, acquisition, or (e) 14 bankruptcy of a business, or any other-transaction by which an existing business 15 reformulates itself as another business, does not create new eligibility in a succeeding business with respect to credits for which the predecessor was not eligible under this 16 17 Article. A successor business may, however, take any installment of or carried-over 18 portion of a credit that its predecessor could have taken if it had a tax liability. The acquisition of a business is a new investment that creates new eligibility in the acquiring 19 20 taxpayer under this Article if either of the following conditions are met: 21 (1)The business closed before it was acquired. 22 The business was required to file a notice of plant closing or mass layoff (2)23 under the federal Worker Adjustment and Retraining Notification Act, 24 29 U.S.C. § 2102, before it was acquired. "§ 105-129.5. (Repealed effective January 1, 2002) Tax election; cap. 25 Tax Election. - The credits provided in this Article are allowed against the 26 (a) 27 franchise tax levied in Article 3 of this Chapter and the income taxes levied in Article 4 The credit for investing in central administrative office property 28 of this Chapter. provided in G.S. 105-129.12 is also allowed against the gross premiums tax levied in 29 Article 8B of this Chapter. The taxpayer shall elect the tax against which a credit will be 30 claimed when filing the return on which the first installment of the credit is claimed. This 31 32 election is binding. Any carryforwards of the credit must be claimed against the same tax. 33 Cap. – The credits allowed under this Article may not exceed fifty percent (b)(50%) of the tax against which they are claimed for the taxable year, reduced by the sum 34 35 of all other credits allowed against that tax, except tax payments made by or on behalf of the taxpayer. This limitation applies to the cumulative amount of credit, including 36 carryforwards, claimed by the taxpayer under this Article against each tax for the taxable 37 38 year. Any unused portion of the a credit with respect to a large investment may be carried forward for the succeeding five years. 20 years. Any unused portion of any other credit 39 40 may be carried forward for the succeeding five years. "§ 105-129.6. (Repealed effective January 1, 2002) Application; reports. 41 42 Application. – To claim the credits allowed by this Article, the taxpayer must (a)

43 provide with the tax return the certification of the Secretary of Commerce that the

taxpayer meets all of the eligibility requirements of G.S. 105-129.4 with respect to each 1 credit. A taxpayer shall apply to the Secretary of Commerce for certification of 2 3 eligibility. The application must be on a form provided by the Secretary of Commerce 4 and must contain any information necessary for the Secretary of Commerce to determine 5 whether the taxpayer meets the eligibility requirements. If the Secretary of Commerce 6 determines that the taxpayer meets all of the eligibility requirements of G.S. 105-129.4 7 with respect to a credit, the Secretary shall issue a certificate describing the location with 8 respect to which the credit is claimed, outlining the eligibility requirements for the credit, 9 and stating that the taxpayer meets the eligibility requirements. If the Secretary of 10 Commerce determines that the taxpayer does not meet all of the eligibility requirements of G.S. 105-129.4 with respect to a credit, the Secretary must advise the taxpayer in 11 12 writing of the eligibility requirements the taxpayer fails to meet. The Secretary of Commerce may adopt rules in accordance with Chapter 150B of the General Statutes that 13 14 are needed to carry out the Secretary of Commerce's responsibilities under this section. 15 Fee. - When filing an application for certification under this section, the (a1)

taxpayer must pay the Department of Commerce a fee of seventy-five dollars (\$75.00). 16 17 Fees collected under this subsection are receipts of the Department of Commerce.

18 (b)Reports. - The Department of Commerce shall report to the Department of Revenue and to the Fiscal Research Division of the General Assembly by May 1 of each 19 20 year the following information for the 12-month period ending the preceding April 1:

27 To claim a credit allowed by this Article, the taxpayer must provide any information required by the Secretary of Revenue. Every taxpayer claiming a credit under this Article 28 29 shall maintain and make available for inspection by the Secretary of Revenue any records 30 the Secretary considers necessary to determine and verify the amount of the credit to which the taxpayer is entitled. The burden of proving eligibility for the credit and the 31 32 amount of the credit shall rest upon the taxpayer, and no credit shall be allowed to a 33 taxpayer that fails to maintain adequate records or to make them available for inspection.

35 Credit. – A taxpayer that meets the eligibility requirements set out in G.S. 105-(a) 129.4, has five or more employees for at least 40 weeks during the taxable year, and hires 36 an additional full-time employee during that year to fill a position located in this State is 37 38 allowed a credit for creating a new full-time job. The amount of the credit for each new full-time job created is set out in the table below and is based on the enterprise tier of the 39 40 area in which the position is located: located. In addition, if the position is located in a development zone, the amount of the credit is increased by four thousand dollars (\$4,000) 41 42 per job. Area Enterprise Tier 43

A position is located in an area if more than fifty percent (50%) of the employee's duties are performed in the area. The credit may not be taken in the taxable year in which the additional employee is hired. Instead, the credit shall be taken in equal installments over the four years following the taxable year in which the additional employee was hired and shall be conditioned on the continued employment by the taxpayer of the number of full-time employees the taxpayer had upon hiring the employee that caused the taxpayer to qualify for the credit.

13 If, in one of the four years in which the installment of a credit accrues, the number of 14 the taxpayer's full-time employees falls below the number of full-time employees the 15 taxpayer had in the year in which the taxpayer qualified for the credit, the credit expires 16 and the taxpayer may not take any remaining installment of the credit. The taxpayer may, 17 however, take the portion of an installment that accrued in a previous year and was 18 carried forward to the extent permitted under G.S. 105-129.5.

Jobs transferred from one area in the State to another area in the State shall not be considered new jobs for purposes of this section. If, in one of the four years in which the installment of a credit accrues, the position filled by the employee is moved to an area in a higher- or lower-numbered enterprise tier, or is moved from a development zone to an area that is not a development zone, the remaining installments of the credit shall be calculated as if the position had been created initially in the area to which it was moved.

27 Planned Expansion. – A taxpayer that signs a letter of commitment with the (d)Department of Commerce to create at least twenty new full-time jobs in a specific area 28 29 within two years of the date the letter is signed qualifies for the credit in the amount 30 allowed by this section based on the area's enterprise tier and development zone designation for that year even though the employees are not hired that year. The credit 31 32 shall be available in the taxable year after at least twenty employees have been hired if 33 the hirings are within the two-year commitment period. The conditions outlined in subsection (a) apply to a credit taken under this subsection except that if the area is 34 35 redesignated to a higher-numbered enterprise tier or loses its development zone designation after the year the letter of commitment was signed, the credit is allowed 36 37 based on the area's enterprise tier and development zone designation for the year the letter 38 was signed. If the taxpaver does not hire the employees within the two-year period, the 39 taxpayer does not qualify for the credit. However, if the taxpayer qualifies for a credit 40 under subsection (a) in the year any new employees are hired, the taxpayer may take the credit under that subsection. 41

1 2 "§ 105-129.9. (Repealed effective January 1, 2002) Credit for investing in machinery and equipment.

3 Credit. - If a taxpayer that has purchased or leased eligible machinery and (a) 4 equipment places it in service in this State during the taxable year, the taxpayer is allowed a credit equal to seven percent (7%) of the excess of the eligible investment 5 6 amount over the applicable threshold. Machinery and equipment is eligible if is capitalized by the taxpayer for tax purposes under the Code and is not leased to another 7 8 party. In addition, in the case of a large investment, machinery and equipment that is not 9 capitalized by the taxpayer is eligible if the taxpayer leases it from another party. The 10 credit may not be taken for the taxable year in which the equipment is placed in service but shall be taken in equal installments over the seven years following the taxable year in 11 12 which the equipment is placed in service.

13 (b) Eligible Investment Amount. – The eligible investment amount is the lesser of 14 (i) the cost of the <u>eligible</u> machinery and equipment and (ii) the amount by which the cost 15 of all of the taxpayer's <u>eligible</u> machinery and equipment that is in service in this State on 16 the last day of the taxable year exceeds the cost of all of the taxpayer's <u>eligible</u> machinery 17 and equipment that was in service in this State on the last day of the base year. The base 18 year is that year, of the three immediately preceding taxable years, in which the taxpayer 19 had the most <u>eligible</u> machinery and equipment in service in this State.

20 Threshold. — The For eligible machinery and equipment placed in service in a (c) 21 development zone during the taxable year, the applicable threshold is zero. For other eligible machinery and equipment, the applicable threshold is the appropriate amount set 22 23 out in the following table based on the enterprise tier of the area where the eligible 24 machinery and equipment are placed in service during the taxable year. If the taxpayer places eligible machinery and equipment in service in more than one area during the 25 taxable year, the threshold applies separately to the eligible machinery and equipment 26 27 placed in service in each area. If the taxpayer places eligible machinery and equipment in service in an area over the course of a two-year period, the applicable threshold for the 28 29 second taxable year is reduced by the eligible investment amount for the previous taxable 30 year.

37	(d) Expiration. – If, in one of the seven years in which the installment	nt of a credit

accrues, the machinery and equipment with respect to which the credit was claimed are disposed of, taken out of service, or moved out of State, the credit expires and the taxpayer may not take any remaining installment of the credit. The taxpayer may, however, take the portion of an installment that accrued in a previous year and was carried forward to the extent permitted under G.S. 105-129.5.

If, in one of the seven years in which the installment of a credit accrues, the 1 2 machinery and equipment with respect to which the credit was claimed are moved to an 3 area in a higher-numbered enterprise tier, or are moved from a development zone to an 4 area that is not a development zone, the remaining installments of the credit are allowed 5 only to the extent they would have been allowed if the machinery and equipment had 6 been placed in service initially in the area to which they were moved.

Planned Expansion. - A taxpayer that signs a letter of commitment with the 7 (e) 8 Department of Commerce to place specific eligible machinery and equipment in service 9 in an area within two years after the date the letter is signed may, in the year the eligible 10 machinery and equipment are placed in service in that area, calculate the credit for which the taxpayer qualifies based on the area's enterprise tier and development zone 11 12 designation for the vear the letter was signed. All other conditions apply to the credit, but 13 if the area has been redesignated to a higher-numbered enterprise tier or has lost its 14 development zone designation after the year the letter of commitment was signed, the 15 credit is allowed based on the area's enterprise tier and development zone designation for the year the letter was signed. If the taxpaver does not place part or all of the specified 16 17 eligible machinery and equipment in service within the two-year period, the taxpaver 18 does not qualify for the benefit of this subsection with respect to the machinery and equipment not placed in service within the two-year period. However, if the taxpaver 19 20 qualifies for a credit in the year the eligible machinery and equipment are placed in 21 service, the taxpayer may take the credit for that year as if no letter of commitment had been signed pursuant to this subsection. 22

23 "§ 105-129.10. (Repealed effective January 1, 2002) Credit for research and 24 development.

25 (a) General Credit. – A taxpayer that claims for the taxable year a federal income tax credit under section 41-41(a) of the Code for increasing research activities is allowed 26 27 a credit equal to five percent (5%) of the State's apportioned share of the taxpayer's expenditures for increasing research activities. The State's apportioned share of a 28 29 taxpayer's expenditures for increasing research activities is the excess of the taxpayer's qualified research expenses for the taxable year over the base amount, as determined 30 under section 41 of the Code, multiplied by a percentage equal to the ratio of the 31 32 taxpayer's qualified research expenses in this State for the taxable year to the taxpayer's 33 total qualified research expenses for the taxable year.

Alternative Credit. – A taxpayer that claims the alternative incremental credit 34 (b)35 under section 41(c)(4) of the Code for increasing research activities is allowed a credit equal to twenty-five percent (25%) of the State's apportioned share of the federal credit 36 claimed. The State's apportioned share of the federal credit claimed is the amount of the 37 38 alternative incremental credit the taxpayer claimed under section 41(c)(4) of the Code for the taxable year multiplied by a percentage equal to the ratio of the taxpayer's qualified 39 40 research expenses in this State for the taxable year to the taxpayer's total qualified research expenses for the taxable year. 41

42 Definitions. - As used in this section, the terms "qualified research (c)expenses" and "base amount" have the meaning provided in section 41 of the Code. 43

25	amount. The eligible investment amount is the lesser of (i) the cost of the property and
26	(ii) the amount by which the cost of all of the property the taxpayer is using in this State
27	as central administrative offices on the last day of the taxable year exceeds the cost of all
28	of the property the taxpayer was using in this State as central administrative offices on
29	the last day of the base year. The base year is that year, of the three immediately
30	preceding taxable years, in which the taxpayer was using the most property in this State

Mixed Use Property. – If the taxpayer uses only part of the property as the 1 (b) 2 taxpayer's central administrative office, the amount of the credit allowed under this 3 section is reduced by multiplying it by a fraction the numerator of which is the square 4 footage of the property used as the taxpayer's central administrative office and the 5 denominator of which is the total square footage of the property. 6 (c) Expiration. – If, in one of the seven years in which the installment of a credit 7 accrues, the property with respect to which the credit was claimed is no longer used as a 8 central administrative office, the credit expires and the taxpayer may not take any 9 remaining installment of the credit. If, in one of the seven years in which the installment

10 of a credit accrues, part of the property with respect to which the credit was claimed is no longer used as a central administrative office, the remaining installments of the credit 11 12 shall be reduced by multiplying it by the fraction described in subsection (b) of this section. If, in one of the seven years in which the installment of a credit accrues, the total 13 14 number of employees the taxpayer employs at all of its central administrative offices in 15 this State drops by 40 or more, the credit expires and the taxpayer may not take any remaining installment of the credit. 16

In each of these cases, the taxpayer may nonetheless take the portion of an installment 17 18 that accrued in a previous year and was carried forward to the extent permitted under G.S. 105-129.5." 19

PART II. INFRASTRUCTURE FUNDS

1 Section 4. It is the intent of the General Assembly to appropriate funds from 2 the General Fund to the Department of Commerce for the 1998-99 fiscal year to be 3 allocated to the Utility Account of the Industrial Development Fund for use in accordance 4 with G.S. 143B-437.01(b1).

5 Section 5. It is the intent of the General Assembly to appropriate funds from 6 the General Fund to the Department of Commerce for the 1998-99 fiscal year to be 7 allocated to the Industrial Development Fund for use in accordance with G.S. 143B-8 437.01(a).

Section 6. G.S. 143B-437.01 reads as rewritten:

11 (a) Creation and Purpose of Fund. – There is created in the Department of 12 Commerce the Industrial Development Fund to provide funds to assist the local 13 government units of the most economically distressed counties in the State in creating 14 jobs in certain industries. PART IV. EFFECTIVE DATES

8 Section 12. G.S. 105-129.6(a1), as enacted by Section 1 of this act, becomes 9 effective January 1, 1999, and applies to applications filed on or after that date. The 10 amendment to G.S. 105-129.9(c) made by Section 1 of this act is effective for taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 1998. Section 3 of this act becomes effective 11 12 January 1, 1999. The remainder of Part I of this act is effective for taxable years 13 beginning on or after January 1, 1999.

Section 13. Part II of this act becomes effective July 1, 1998. 14
