6	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:		
7	Section 1. (a) There is appropriated from the General Fund to the State Board		
8	of Education the	e sum of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) for the 1997-98 fiscal	
9	year and the sum of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) for the 1998-99 fiscal year		
10	to establish a public-private partnership to encourage, promote, and expand technology in		
11	North Carolina H		
12		The purposes of the public-private partnership are to enlist public,	
13	private, and volunteer sectors to develop creative means of bringing technology to North		
14	Carolina Public	School classrooms at minimal cost and expense to the State and its	
15	taxpayers:		
16	(1)	Help schools wire classrooms with high speed data wire that enables	
17		them to connect to school networks as well as the Internet.	
18	(2)	Develop a plan to increase the number of computers, computing	
19		equipment, and networking equipment in North Carolina Public	
20		Schools.	

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1	(3)	Develop a plan that will assure every school can connect to the Internet
2		so that this tool is made available equally to all children in North
3		Carolina Public Schools.
4	(4)	Help develop programs to train teachers and other educators in the use
5		of technology.
6	(5)	Develop Internet-based learning programs designed to assist teachers in
7		the job of helping young people learn.
8	(6)	Test and evaluate the benefits of each of the projects; investigate and
9		develop other means of using computer-based technology in
10		classrooms; and assure that this information is available to educators.
11	(c)	Pursuant to subdivision (2) of subsection (b) of this section, a vocational
12		puter recycling pilot program shall be established. The purposes of the
13	pilot program are to:	
14	(1)	Develop and implement high school vocational education programs that
15	(-)	train students to test, repair, reconfigure, upgrade, and maintain donated
16		computers.
17	(2)	Enhance a community's opportunities for economic development by
18	(-)	providing vocational education students with educational, job, and
19		hireability skills as well as skills in computer technology.
20	(3)	Provide upgraded computers to schools, consistent with State-approved
21	$(\mathbf{J})$	local school technology plans at a cost of four hundred dollars (\$400.00)
22		to six hundred dollars (\$600.00) per unit rather than new computers
23		costing around three thousand dollars (\$3,000) each; and
24	(4)	Help communities support their schools by encouraging business and
25	(+)	industry to donate computer components to schools or sell them at

20 27	(5)	The State Board of Education, after consultation with ExplorNet, shall

31		program, (ii) the degree of community support for such a program, and

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available to the State Board of Education, when requested by the State Board of 1 2 Education. 3 (f) The State Board of Education shall evaluate the educational components 4 of the programs. 5 The State Board's contract with ExplorNet shall require ExplorNet to evaluate 6 the technical components of the program and to submit the results of its evaluation to the Information Resources Management Commission for review and comment by May 15, 7 8 1999. The Information Resources Management Commission shall submit the evaluation 9 done by ExplorNet and the Commission's comments on it to the State Board of Education by August 15, 1999. 10 The State Board of Education shall report the results of these evaluations to the 11 12 Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee by September 15, 1999. 13 Section 2. This act becomes effective July 1, 1997.

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
