3	PROVIDE (CRAFTWORKER TRAINING TO EMPLOYEES AND WHO HIRE
4	WELFARE RECIPIENTS.	
5	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:	
6	Section 1. G.S. 105-129.2 reads as rewritten:

39	the average wee	kly wage of jobs, positions that pay a wage or salary at a rate that exceeds	
40	one hundred the	busand dollars (\$100,000) a year shall be excluded. For the purpose of this	
41	subsection, the	average wage in a county is the average wage for all insured industries in	

42 the county as computed by the Employment Security Commission for the most recent

43 period for which data are available.

1 (c) Worker Training. – A taxpayer is eligible for the tax credit for worker training 2 only for training workers who occupy jobs for which the taxpayer is eligible to claim an 3 installment of the credit for creating jobs or which are full-time positions at a location 4 with respect to which the taxpayer is eligible to claim an installment of the credit for 5 investing in machinery and equipment for the taxable year.

5 6 The credit for worker training is allowed only with respect to employees in positions 7 not classified as exempt under the Fair Labor Standards Act, 29 U.S.C. § 213(a)(1) and 8 for expenditures for training that would be eligible for expenditure or reimbursement 9 under the Department of Community Colleges' New and Expanding Industry Program, as 10 determined by guidelines adopted by the State Board of Community Colleges. To establish eligibility, the taxpayer must obtain as part of the application process under G.S. 11 12 105-129.6 the certification of the Department of Community Colleges that the taxpaver's 13 planned worker training would satisfy the requirements of this paragraph. A taxpayer 14 shall apply to the Department of Community Colleges for this certification. The 15 application must be on a form provided by the Department of Community Colleges, must provide a detailed plan of the worker training to be provided, and must contain any 16 17 information required by the Department of Community Colleges to determine whether 18 the requirements of this paragraph will be satisfied. If the Department of Community Colleges determines that the planned worker training meets the requirements of this 19 20 paragraph, the Department of Community Colleges shall issue a certificate describing the 21 location with respect to which the credit is claimed and stating that the planned worker training meets the requirements of this paragraph. The State Board of Community 22 23 Colleges may adopt rules in accordance with Chapter 150B of the General Statutes that 24 are needed to carry out its responsibilities under this paragraph.

(c1) Construction Craftworker Training. – A taxpayer is eligible for the tax credit
 for construction craftworker training only for training construction craftworkers in
 positions not classified as exempt under the Fair Labor Standards Act, 29 U.S.C. §
 213(a)(1), and only for training provided pursuant to a program that satisfies the
 following conditions:

38 To establish eligibility, the taxpayer must obtain as part of the application process under 39 G.S. 105-129.6 certification that the taxpayer's planned construction craftworker training 40 would satisfy the requirements of this subsection. A taxpayer must apply to the 41 Department of Labor for certification of registered apprenticeships and certified on-the-

42 job training and to the Department of Community Colleges for certification of all other

43 training. The application must be on a form provided by the certifying Department, must

provide a detailed plan of the construction craftworker training to be provided, and must 1 2 contain any information required by the certifying Department to determine whether the 3 requirements of this subsection will be satisfied. If the certifying Department determines 4 that the planned construction craftworker training meets the requirements of this 5 subsection, it shall issue a certificate describing the taxpayer, identifying the entity that 6 approved the training program, and stating that the planned construction craftworker 7 training meets the requirements of this subsection. The State Board of Community Colleges and the Department of Labor may adopt rules in accordance with Chapter 150B 8 9 of the General Statutes that are needed to carry out their responsibilities under this 10 subsection.

(d) Forfeiture. – A taxpayer forfeits a credit allowed under this Article if the 11 12 taxpayer was not eligible for the credit at the time the taxpayer applied for the credit. A taxpayer that forfeits a credit under this Article is liable for all past taxes avoided as a 13 14 result of the credit plus interest at the rate established under G.S. 105-241.1(i), computed 15 from the date the taxes would have been due if the credit had not been allowed. The past 16 taxes and interest are due 30 days after the date the credit is forfeited; a taxpayer that fails 17 to pay the past taxes and interest by the due date is subject to the penalties provided in 18 G.S. 105-236. If a taxpayer forfeits the credit for creating jobs or the credit for investing in machinery and equipment, the taxpayer also forfeits any credit for worker training 19 20 claimed for the jobs for which the credit for creating jobs was claimed or the jobs at the 21 location with respect to which the credit for investing in machinery and equipment was claimed. 22

- (e) Change in Ownership of Business. The sale, merger, acquisition, or
 bankruptcy of a business, or any other transaction by which an existing business
 reformulates itself as another business, does not create new eligibility in a succeeding
 business with respect to credits for which the predecessor was not eligible under this
 Article. A successor business may, however, take any installment of or carried-over
 portion of a credit that its predecessor could have taken if it had a tax liability."
 - Section 3. G.S. 105-129.8 reads as rewritten:

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30 "§ 105-129.8. (Repealed effective January 1, 2002) Credit Credits for creating jobs.

(a) <u>Credit.Creating Jobs.</u> – A taxpayer that meets the eligibility requirements set
out in G.S. 105-129.4, has five or more employees for at least 40 weeks during the
taxable year, and hires an additional full-time employee during that year to fill a position
located in this State is allowed a credit for creating a new full-time job. The amount of
the credit for each new full-time job created is set out in the table below and is based on
the enterprise tier of the area in which the position is located:

39	Tier Two	4,000
40	Tier Three	3,000

A position is located in an area if more than fifty percent (50%) of the employee's 1 2 duties are performed in the area. 3 Creating Construction Jobs for Welfare Recipients. - A taxpayer that is (a1) 4 engaged in the construction business, has five or more employees for at least 40 weeks 5 during the taxable year, and hires a welfare recipient as an additional full-time employee 6 during the year is allowed a credit of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the job. 7 The credit may not be taken in the taxable year in which the additional (a2) 8 employee is hired. Instead, the credit shall be taken in equal installments over the four 9 years following the taxable year in which the additional employee was hired and shall be 10 conditioned on the continued employment by the taxpayer of the number of full-time employees the taxpayer had upon hiring the employee that caused the taxpayer to qualify 11 12 for the credit. 13 If, in one of the four years in which the installment of a credit accrues, the number of 14 the taxpayer's full-time employees falls below the number of full-time employees the 15 taxpayer had in the year in which the taxpayer gualified for the credit, the credit expires and the taxpayer may not take any remaining installment of the credit. The taxpayer may, 16 17 however, take the portion of an installment that accrued in a previous year and was 18 carried forward to the extent permitted under G.S. 105-129.5. If, in one of the four years in which the installment of a credit accrues, a job for which 19 20 the welfare recipient credit was allowed is no longer filled by a welfare recipient, the 21 credit expires and the taxpayer may not take any remaining installment of the welfare recipient credit with respect to that job. 22 23 Jobs transferred from one area in the State to another area in the State shall not be 24 considered new jobs for purposes of this section. If, in one of the four years in which the installment of a credit accrues, the position filled by the employee is moved to an area in 25 a higher- or lower-numbered enterprise tier, the remaining installments of the credit shall 26 27 be calculated as if the position had been created initially in the area to which it was 28 moved. 29 Repealed by Session Laws 1989, c. 111, s. 1. (b)(b1), (c) Repealed by Session Laws 1996, Second Extra Session, c. 13, s. 3.3. 30 Planned Expansion. – A taxpayer that signs a letter of commitment with the 31 (d)Department of Commerce to create at least twenty new full-time jobs in a specific area 32 33 within two years of the date the letter is signed qualifies for the credit in the amount allowed by subsection (a) of this section based on the area's enterprise tier for that year 34 35 even though the employees are not hired that year. The credit shall be available in the taxable year after at least twenty employees have been hired if the hirings are within the 36 37 two-year commitment period. The conditions outlined in subsection (a) apply to a credit 38 taken under this subsection except that if the area is redesignated to a higher-numbered 39 enterprise tier after the year the letter of commitment was signed, the credit is allowed based on the area's enterprise tier for the year the letter was signed. If the taxpayer does 40 not hire the employees within the two-year period, the taxpayer does not qualify for the 41 42 credit. However, if the taxpayer qualifies for a credit under subsection (a) in the year any new employees are hired, the taxpayer may take the credit under that subsection. 43

4	"§ 105-129.11. (Repealed effective January 1, 2002) Credit for worker training.	
5	Credits for worker training and construction craftworker training.	
6	(a) <u>Credit.Worker Training.</u> – A taxpayer that provides worker training for five or	
7	more of its eligible employees during the taxable year is allowed a credit equal to fifty	
8	percent (50%) of its eligible expenditures for the training. For positions located in an	
9	enterprise tier one area, the credit may not exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000) per	
10	employee trained during the taxable year. For other positions, the credit may not exceed	
11	five hundred dollars (\$500.00) per employee trained during the taxable year. A position is	
12	located in an area if more than fifty percent (50%) of the employee's duties are performed	
13	in the area.	
14	(b) Eligibility. – The eligibility of a taxpayer's expenditures and employees is determined	
15	as provided in G.S. 105-129.4. Construction Craftworker Training A taxpayer that is	
16	engaged in the construction business and provides construction craftworker training to its	
17	eligible employees is allowed a credit equal to five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for each	
18	employee who completes his or her 1,000th hour of the provided training during the	
19	taxable year.	
20	(c) Eligibility. – The eligibility of a taxpayer's training, expenditures, and	
21	employees is determined as provided in G.S. 105-129.4."
