BILL SUMMARY: *TO DIVIDE DISTRICT COURT DISTRICT 30 AND PROSECUTORIAL DISTRICT 30 INTO DISTRICTS 30A AND 30B.* District 30A will be comprised of Cherokee, Clay, Graham, Macon and Swain counties and will have two district judges and four assistant district attorneys. District 30B will be comprised of Haywood and Jackson counties and have two district judges and three assistant district attorneys. District court judgeships for District 30A will be filled by district court judges from current District 30 who reside in Cherokee and Swain counties. Judgeships for District 30B will be filled by judges from current District 30 who reside in Haywood County. District attorney position for District 30B will be filled by district attorney for current District 30. Governor will appoint district attorney for District 30A. Appropriates \$200,777 for 1997-98 and \$193,154 for 1998-99 from General Fund to Judicial Dept. to implement provisions of act. Effective Oct. 1, 1997 or date upon which act's provisions are approved under sec. 5 of Voting Rights Act of 1965, whichever is later.

ASSUMPTIONS AND METHODOLOGY:

The proposed legislation would divide District Court District 30 and Prosecutorial District 30 into Districts 30A and 30B. The new district 30A would comprise Cherokee, Clay, Graham, Macon, and Swain counties and would have two district court judges and four assistant district attorneys. The new District 30B would include Haywood and Jackson counties and would have two district court judges and three assistant district attorneys. Determination of the fiscal impact was based generally on the following assumptions:

- 1. Two district court judges in 30A would be filled by judges who currently reside in Cherokee and Swain Counties;
- 2. Two district court judges in 30B would be filled by judges currently living in Haywood County;
- 3. District Attorney for 30B would be filled by current District Attorney for District 30;
- 4. Additional District Attorney for 30A would be appointed by the Governor;
- 5. The seven assistant district attorney positions in current District 30 would be divided between new districts; and, most importantly,
- 6. Balancing workload between new districts is a desirable goal.

FISCAL IMPACT OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

Two alternative fiscal impact scenarios are provided in this note. The first alternative, with which the Fiscal Research Division concurs, is provided by the Judicial Department. The second alternative, which has some minor differences from the first alternative, is offered by the Fiscal Research Division.

Alternative #1 - Judicial Department

This alternative includes the salaries and benefits, along with associated equipment and operating costs, for the following:

- upgrade one district court judge to a chief district court judge as required by statute
- add one judicial assistant for new chief judge
- upgrade one court counselor to a chief court counselor
- add one court counselor secretary to assist chief counselor
- add one district attorney for district 30A
- add one district attorney investigator
- add one administrative assistant to work with district attorney

The estimated costs of doing alternative #1 are outlined in Table 1 below.

Alternative #2 - Proposed by Fiscal Research

This alternative is the same as alternative #1 except that it excludes funds for the additional district attorney investigator position and increases in equipment costs associated with upgrading one district court judge and court counselor. Specifically, it includes:

- upgrade a district court judge to a chief district court judge (minus added equipment which includes laptop PC system, printer, CD -ROM, connectivity, software, wiring, maintenance, and law books)
- add one judicial assistant for new chief judge
- upgrade one court counselor to a chief court counselor (minus added equipment which includes PC system, laser printer, connectivity, software, wiring maintenance, copier, file cabinet)
- add one court counselor secretary to assist chief counselor

- add one district attorney
- add one administrative assistant to work with district attorney

The estimated costs of doing alternative #2 are outlined in table 2 below.

Personnel Requirements

<u>Assistant District Attorneys:</u> No additional ADA's would be needed since the 7 positions currently working in District 30 could be transferred to Districts 30A and 30B. Under this proposal, 4 positions would transfer to District 30A (Cherokee, Clay, Graham, Macon, Swain) and 3 positions would transfer to District 30B (Haywood and Jackson). The one additional ADA is allocated to 30A because of the geographical area of the district.

<u>District Attorneys</u>: District 30A would need to have a District Attorney appointed by the Governor since the existing District 30 DA resides in the new District 30B.

District Attorney Legal Assistant: The new District Attorney in District 30A would need a legal assistant.

<u>District Attorney Investigator</u>: The current District 30 only has one investigator position. Thus, if both new districts were to continue having an investigator, one position would need to be added. The costs estimates outlined in **Table 1 - Alternative #1** include funding for an additional investigator position as recommended by the Judicial Department. **Table 2 - Alternative #2** does not include funding for an additional investigator since there is no statutory requirement that investigators be established for each prosecutorial district. Currently, there are 20 district attorney investigator positions statewide.

<u>District Court Judges:</u> The four existing district court judges would be divided evenly between new Districts 30A and 30B, with one judge being upgraded to a chief judge. This is necessary so each new district would have a chief judge as required by statute.

District Court Judge Judicial Assistant: The upgraded chief district court judge would need a judicial assistant.
