- LEGISLATIVE SESSIONS AND TO PROVIDE FOUR-YEAR TERMS FOR
  MEMBERS OF THE SENATE. If the constitutional amendments proposed in those
  sections are approved by the voters, Section 1 of this act becomes effective with respect
  to members of the General Assembly elected in 2000, and Sections 2 and 3 become
- 5 effective with respect to Senators elected in 2002.
- 6 Section 5. This act is effective when it becomes law.
