2 AN ACT TO DIRECT THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN 3 SERVICES TO EXPLORE METHODS TO IMPROVE AND REWARD 4 QUALITY OF CARE PROVIDED BY LONG-TERM CARE FACILITIES; AND

TO DIRECT THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES TO

ESTABLISH A QUALITY IMPROVEMENT CONSULTATION PROGRAM.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1.(a) The General Assembly recognizes that the imposition of penalties for deficiencies in meeting licensure requirements is not the exclusive method for ensuring quality of care in licensed long-term care facilities. The Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Long-Term Care, shall explore methods to improve and reward quality of care provided by long-term care facilities. In conducting this undertaking, the Department shall consider and report specifically its findings and recommendations on all of the following:

- (1) Amending current law to allow extension of the licensure period and survey period for adult care homes with a good record of compliance and in the absence of consumer complaints. A recommendation to authorize the extension shall include the recommended length of the extension of the licensure and of the survey period, and the standard for what constitutes a good record of compliance and level of consumer complaint.
- (2) Increasing the reimbursement rate for long-term care providers that consistently perform over and above the minimum standard of care. A recommendation to increase the rate shall include the recommended level of increase and the basis for determining the level of increase.
- (3) The feasibility and potential effectiveness of financial rewards for long-term care providers that:

a. Demonstrate innovation in problem areas such as maintaining low-staff turnover and handling difficult behavior problems. A recommendation to provide financial rewards shall include the recommended level of reward, the basis for determining the award amount, and the specific innovations that warrant an award.

b. Obtain accreditation from nationally recognized organizations attesting to performance above the minimum standards of care.

(4) Whether to cap allowable indirect costs for adult care homes similar to that imposed on nursing homes, but also allowing a higher capped direct rate of reimbursement in order to provide incentives for higher quality direct care to residents.

(5) Whether a different approach should be adopted for setting reimbursement rates for adult care homes that would replace the current 'State average' method. The purpose of the different approach is to provide incentives to facilities to operate more efficiently and reinvest resources saved from efficiency in higher quality care.

SECTION 1.(b) The Department shall report the status of its activities under this section to the Study Commission on Aging not later than October 1, 2002. Not later than March 1, 2002, the Department shall submit its final report to the Study Commission on Aging and to the House of Representatives and Senate Appropriations Committees on Health and Human Services. The final report shall include recommended legislation for consideration by the Regular Session 2002 of the 2001 General Assembly.

 SECTION 2. The Department of Health and Human Services shall develop a Quality Improvement Consultation Program. The purpose of the program is to assist providers in the development of quality improvement plans for each facility and program offering long-term care in North Carolina. The Quality Improvement Consultation Program shall be developed in consultation with the Office of Long-Term Care, the Division of Facility Services, and representatives of facilities and programs. The Department shall use funds appropriated to it for this purpose for the 2001-2002 and 2002-2003 fiscal years. The Department shall report the status of its activities under this section to the North Carolina Study Commission on Aging on October 1, 2001, and March 1, 2002.

SECTION 4. This act becomes effective July 1, 2001.
