1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2	AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE THE LEGISLATIVE RESEARCH COMMISSION TO
3	STUDY ISSUES RELATED TO CRIMINAL HISTORY RECORD CHECKS OF
4	EMPLOYEES OF LONG-TERM CARE PROVIDERS.
5	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
6	<b>SECTION 1.</b> The Legislative Research Commission may study how federal
7	law affects the distribution of national criminal history record check information
8	requested for nursing homes, home care agencies, adult care homes, assisted living
9	facilities, and area mental health, developmental disabilities, and substance abuse
10	services authorities, and the problems federal restrictions pose for effective and efficient
11	implementation of State-required criminal record checks. The study may include the
12	following:
13	(1) Ways in which national record checks may be obtained and reviewed
14	for these facilities to effectuate State policies and protections of
15	facility residents, and the advantages, disadvantages, and costs of
16	various approaches to implementation.
17	(2) A review of ways in which national record checks are obtained by the
18	Division of Child Development, Department of Health and Human
19	Services, and other State agencies, and related costs to the State.
20	(3) Solutions adopted by other states to effectively and efficiently
21	implement criminal record check requirements, including costs to the
22	State in implementing these solutions.
23	(4) Other issues relevant to State requirements for criminal history record
24	checks in long-term care facilities.
25	The Legislative Research Commission may make its findings and
26	recommendations in a final report to the 2003 General Assembly prior to its convening.
27	<b>SECTION 2.</b> This act is effective when it becomes law.
