AN ACT TO ESTABLISH A MAXIMUM SPEED LIMIT OF SIXTY-FIVE MILES

PER HOUR FOR COMMERCIAL MOTOR VEHICLES ON HIGHWAYS WITH

A SEVENTY-MILE-PER-HOUR SPEED LIMIT FOR OTHER MOTOR

5 VEHICLES.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. G.S. 20-141(d) reads as rewritten:

- "(d) (1) Whenever the Department of Transportation determines on the basis of an engineering and traffic investigation that any speed allowed by subsection (b) is greater than is reasonable and safe under the conditions found to exist upon any part of a highway outside the corporate limits of a municipality or upon any part of a highway designated as part of the Interstate Highway System or any part of a controlled-access highway (either inside or outside the corporate limits of a municipality), the Department of Transportation shall determine and declare a reasonable and safe speed limit.
 - (2) Whenever the Department of Transportation determines on the basis of an engineering and traffic investigation that a higher maximum speed than those set forth in subsection (b) is reasonable and safe under the conditions found to exist upon any part of a highway designated as part of the Interstate Highway System or any part of a controlled-access highway (either inside or outside the corporate limits of a municipality) the Department of Transportation shall determine and declare a reasonable and safe speed limit. A speed limit set pursuant to this subsection may not exceed 70 miles per hour. On any highway with a motor vehicle speed limit of 70 miles per hour, the speed limit for commercial motor vehicles shall not exceed 65 miles per hour.

- Speed limits set pursuant to this subsection are not effective until appropriate signs giving notice thereof are erected upon the parts of the highway affected."
- SECTION 2. This act becomes effective December 1, 2001, and applies to offenses committed on or after that date.
