1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2	AN ACT TO ESTABLISH THE CLEAN AIR TRUST FUND AND TO
3	APPROPRIATE FUNDS TO IT.
4	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
5	SECTION 1. Chapter 113A of the General Statutes is amended by adding a
6	new Article to read:
7	" <u>Article 19.</u>
8	" <u>Clean Air Trust Fund.</u>
9	" <u>§ 113A-271. Purpose.</u>
10	(a) The General Assembly finds and declares that clean air is critical to the health
11	of the citizens, economy, and environment of North Carolina. The General Assembly
12	recognizes that emissions of oxides of nitrogen (NOx), oxides of sulfur (SOx), fine
13	particulate matter, mercury, and hydrocarbons from stationary and mobile sources cause
14	unhealthy levels of ozone, fine particulate matter, acid deposition, nitrogen deposition,
15	mercury contamination, and other air pollutants.
16	(b) The General Assembly is committed to reducing air pollution to restore
17	mountain air quality, to provide healthy air to urban and rural citizens of the State, to
18	protect crops and forests, to reduce deposition of nitrogen into nutrient sensitive waters,
19	to reduce mercury contamination in fish and the environment, to enhance the travel and
20	tourism industry, and to maintain the high quality of life of the citizens of the State.
21	(c) <u>The General Assembly finds that education, technical assistance, incentives,</u>
22	and regulations are all needed to prevent and reduce emissions of air pollutants and to
23	protect the environment, public health, natural resources, and the economy.
24	(d) <u>The General Assembly finds that cleaner fuels, alternative fuels, energy</u>
25	efficiency, transit, smart growth, public education, and awareness will prevent and
26	reduce emissions of air pollutants.
27	(e) <u>The General Assembly finds and declares that an incentive-based air quality</u>
28	program is needed to assist local governments, State agencies, nonprofit conservation
29	organizations, and industry to help finance projects that prevent or reduce emissions of

4	<u>funds.</u>
5	(a) Eligible Applicants. – Any of the following are eligible to apply for a grant or
6	loan from the Fund for the purpose of protecting and restoring air quality and preventing
7	and reducing emissions of air pollution:
8	(1) <u>A State agency.</u>
9	(2) <u>A local government or other political subdivision of the State or a</u>
10	combination of such entities.
11	(3) <u>A nonprofit corporation whose primary purpose is the protection and</u>
12	restoration of the environment and natural resources.
13	(b) Grant Matching Requirement The Board of Trustees may establish
14	matching requirements for grants awarded under this Article.
15	(c) Loans. – The Board of Trustees may provide loans to applicants.
16	(d) Grants and Loans Not Available to Satisfy Excess Emissions Offsets or
17	Conformity Requirements. – No grant or loan from the Fund shall be awarded to satisfy
18	excess emissions offsets allowed under 40 Code of Federal Regulations § 77.3 (1 July
19	2002 Edition) or transportation conformity requirements set out in 40 Code of Federal
20	Regulations Part 51 and Part 93 (1 July 2002 Edition).
21	(e) Grants and Loans Not Available to Achieve Compliance with State Emissions
22	Limits No grant or loan from the Fund shall be awarded to achieve compliance with
23	the limitation of emissions of oxides of nitrogen (NOx) and sulfur dioxide (SO2) set out
24	<u>in G.S. 143-215.107D.</u>

27	(a) Board of Trustees Established. – There is established the Clean Air Trust
28	Fund Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees shall be administratively located within
29	the Department of Environment and Natural Resources but shall be independent of the
30	Department.
31	(b) <u>Membership. – The Board of Trustees shall be composed of nine members</u>
32	appointed to four-year terms as follows:

14	criteria for awarding grants and loans under this Article. The Board of Trustees shall
15	consider the following:
16	(1) Consistency with the State's statutory and regulatory programs for air
17	pollution control.
18	(2) Complementing regional and local plans to prevent and reduce air
19	pollution.
20	(3) Attainment and maintenance of State and federal ambient air quality
21	standards for ozone and fine particulate matter.

23	(5) Protection and restoration of scenic views.
24	(6) <u>Protection of areas with good air quality.</u>
25	(7) <u>Restoration of areas with poor air quality.</u>

30	(c) <u>Develop Additional Guidelines</u> . – The Board of Trustees may develop
31 32	guidelines in addition to the grant and loan criteria consistent with and as necessary to implement this Article.

38	to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations, the Environmental

41	Resources of the House of Representatives Appropriations Committee, and the Fiscal
42	Research Division of the General Assembly regarding the implementation of this
43	Article. The report shall include a list of the projects awarded grants or loans from the
