Short Title: Study of Workforce Preparation in Schools.

2	AN ACT ESTABLISHING A COMMISSION TO STUDY WORKFORCE
3	PREPARATION IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.
4	Whereas, for today's youth, life after high school holds both the opportunity
5	of getting one of the many well-paying, high-skilled jobs in the global economy and the
6	challenge of getting the education and skills necessary to get and keep one of those jobs;
7	and
8	Whereas, students must leave high school with a solid grounding in the
9	academic, social, and workplace skills needed for the next step, whether it be
10	postsecondary education, an apprenticeship, or a career; and
11	Whereas, today's youth, living and working in the 21 st century, need solid
12	academic preparation not just for college but for the trades, automotive repair, high-tech
13	manufacturing, and other jobs that provide self-supporting income; and
14	Whereas, today's youth also need the skills to manage their personal lives,
15	guide their families, and actively exercise the rights and responsibilities of citizenship;
16	and
17	Whereas, North Carolina must raise the expectations of its young people and
18	use its resources to expand their opportunities; and
19	Whereas, entirely too many high school students are dropping out of school
20	in North Carolina; and
21	Whereas, entirely too many high school graduates are not adequately
22	prepared for success in the workforce, community college, or a four-year college; and
23	Whereas, it is essential that the State assess the quality of high school
24	graduates leaving North Carolina schools, develop strategies for improving student
25	preparedness for the workforce or higher education, and improve upon current strategies
26	regarding vocational training; Now, therefore:
27	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

(Public)

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1	SECTION 1. There is created the Study Commission on Workforce
2	Preparation in the Public Schools. The Commission shall consist of 10 members as
3	follows:
4	(1) One businessperson, one school administrator, and one other educator,
5	appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate;
6	(2) One business person, one vocational education teacher, and one other
7	educator, appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives;
8	(3) Two Senators appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate;
9	and
10	(4) Two Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House of
11	Representatives.
12	The President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall appoint a cochair, and the
13	Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint a cochair for the Commission.
14	The Commission may meet at anytime upon the joint call of the cochairs. Vacancies on
15	the Commission shall be filled by the same appointing authority as made the initial
16	appointment.
17	SECTION 2. In the course of the study, the Commission shall:
18	(1) Consider the State's progress in meeting the student performance
19	benchmarks required by the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001;
20	(2) Assess the effectiveness of workforce preparation strategies;
21	(3) Assess efficiency within workforce preparation strategies;
22	(4) Evaluate the preparedness of North Carolina high school graduates by:
23	a. Studying remediation rates and efforts at the community
24	colleges,
25	b. Studying remediation rates and efforts at the constituent
26	institutions of The University of North Carolina, and
27	c. Surveying representatives of business and industry and of the
28	United States Department of Defense. The survey shall elicit
29	information on how well high school graduates are prepared
30	with regard to basic skills and knowledge, how well high school
31	graduates are prepared with regard to job-oriented skills, and
32	how business, industry, and the military are addressing any
33	deficiencies they encounter; and
34	(5) Study any other issues the Commission considers relevant.
35	SECTION 3. The Commission, while in the discharge of its official duties,
36	may exercise all powers provided for under G.S. 120-19 and G.S. 120-19.1 through
37	G.S. 120-19.4. The Commission may contract for professional, clerical, or consultant
38	services as provided by G.S. 120-32.02.
39	Subject to the approval of the Legislative Services Commission, the
40	Commission may meet in the Legislative Building or the Legislative Office Building.
41	The Legislative Services Commission, through the Legislative Services Officer, shall
42	assign professional staff to assist the Commission in its work. The House of
43	Representatives' and the Senate's Supervisors of Clerks shall assign clerical support staff
44	to the Commission, and the expenses relating to the clerical employees shall be borne

by the Commission. Members of the Commission shall receive subsistence and travel 1 expenses at the rates set forth in G.S. 120-3.1, 138-5, or 138-6, as appropriate. 2 3 **SECTION 4.** The Commission shall submit a final report to the State Board 4 of Education, the Department of Labor, and the 2006 Regular Session of the 2005 General Assembly. The report shall include recommended changes to workforce 5 6 preparation strategies to ensure efficiency such as (i) strategies for consolidating State worker training programs and (ii) State partnerships with business and industry to 7 support private training programs. 8 The Commission shall terminate upon submission of its final report.

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10 **SECTION 5.** This act becomes effective July 1, 2005.
