1	A JOINT RESOLUTION URGING CONGRESS TO END NORTH CAROLINA'S
2	STATUS AS A DONOR STATE OF FEDERAL HIGHWAY TAX REVENUES,
3	AND TO RETURN ONE HUNDRED PERCENT OF THE FEDERAL HIGHWAY
4	REVENUES THE STATE REMITS TO THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT EACH
5	YEAR, IN ORDER FOR THE STATE TO ADDRESS ITS URGENT
6	TRANSPORTATION NEEDS, AS RECOMMENDED BY THE 21 ST CENTURY
7	TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE.
8	Whereas, under the federal Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act
9	of 1991, the State received 82.7% return on the federal highway tax revenue it remitted
10	to the federal Highway Trust Fund; and
11	Whereas, under the federal 1998 Transportation Equity Act for the 21 st
12	Century (TEA-21), the State received 89.2% return on the federal highway tax revenue
13	it remitted to the federal Highway Trust Fund; and
14	Whereas, the 2005 federal Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient
15	Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU) promised that the State
16	would increase its share of federal highway revenue to 92% by the 2008-2009 fiscal
17	year; and
18	Whereas, under SAFETEA-LU, the State has so far received only 89.7% of
19	the federal highway tax revenue it remitted to the federal Highway Trust Fund; and
20	Whereas, since 1956, the State has contributed \$18,133,902,000 in federal
21	highway tax revenue, but only received \$16,474,174,000 in return; and
22	Whereas, North Carolina is a rapidly growing State with urgent transportation
23	needs; and
24	Whereas, the State is strategically located along the east coast transportation
25	corridor; and
26	Whereas, the State is home to many important federal military installations
27	that would benefit from improved transportation infrastructure; and

Whereas, the State has complied with federal transportation safety mandates;
 and

Whereas, the State's urgent transportation needs that could be addressed if the
State received a fair share of the federal highway tax revenue it remitted to the federal
Highway Trust Fund each year; Now, therefore,

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Be it resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring:

7 **SECTION 1.** The President of the United States and the United States 8 Congress are urged to provide the State with all the federal highway tax funds it was 9 promised under the 2005 federal Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation 10 Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU), and to end the State's status as a 11 donor state of federal highway tax revenues in the next federal transportation 12 reauthorization act, due for enactment by Congress in 2009, by providing the State with 13 one hundred percent (100%) of the federal highway funds it remits in federal taxes to the federal Highway Trust Fund each year. 14

15 **SECTION 2.** The President of the United States and the United States 16 Congress are respectfully requested to advise the North Carolina General Assembly of 17 the actions they intend to take to address the current inequities in federal transportation 18 funding.

SECTION 3. The President of the United States and the United States
 Congress are advised that the North Carolina General Assembly supports federal
 legislation designating federal transportation funds for the replacement of the Yadkin
 River Bridge on Interstate 85 in Davidson and Rowan Counties.

SECTION 4. The Secretary of State shall transmit a copy of this joint
 resolution to the President of the United States and to each member of the United States
 Congress representing North Carolina.

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SECTION 5. This resolution is effective upon ratification.
