SEC	FION 2. The first report due under G.S. 106-833, as enacted by Section 1 of
this act, is due no	b later than October 1, 2010.
SEC	FION 3. The initial terms of the members of the North Carolina Sustainable
Local Food Adv	visory Council created by G.S. 106-831, as enacted by Section 1 of this act,
shall commence	no later than October 1, 2009. In order to provide for a system of staggered
three-year terms	for the members of the North Carolina Sustainable Local Food Advisory
Council, the follo	owing provisions shall apply:
(1)	The terms of the members initially appointed to serve in the positions
	established by G.S. 106-831(a)(4) through G.S. 106-831(a)(8) shall be three
	years and shall expire on July 1, 2012.
(2)	The terms of the members initially appointed to serve in the positions
	established by G.S. 106-831(a)(9) through G.S. 106-831(a)(16) shall be four
	years and shall expire on July 1, 2013.
(3)	The terms of the members initially appointed to serve in the positions
	established by G.S. 106-831(a)(17) through G.S. 106-831(a)(24) shall be
	five years and shall expire on July 1, 2014.
SEC	FION 4. This act is effective when it becomes law and shall expire on July 31,
