8	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:	
9	SECTION 1.(a) By September 1, 2011, the Department of Health and Human	
10	Services (Department) shall study and submit a report to the Joint Legislative Oversight	
11	Committee on Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services on a	
12	revised process for collecting data to develop a waiting list of persons with intellectual or	
13	developmental disabilities who are waiting for specific services. The revised process shall	
14	ensure all of the following:	
15	(1) A simple, nonduplicated count of children and adults with intellectual or	
16	developmental disabilities across the State who are waiting for federally and	
17	State-funded services.	
18	(2) A research-based waiting list supported by data that accurately reflects the	
19	number of individuals waiting for categories of services currently available	
20	in this State.	
21	(3) Data showing the number of individuals who are potentially eligible to	
22	receive services under the CAP-MR/DD Waiver.	
23	SECTION 1.(b) Beginning September 30, 2012, and annually thereafter, the	
24	Department shall submit a report to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Mental	
25	Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services on the waiting list data	
26	collected from each local management entity. The report shall include (i) an analysis of any	
27	service gaps revealed by the data, broken down by geographic location, age, and disability and	

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(ii) plans to address these service gaps.SECTION 2. This act is effective when it becomes law.
