This Article may be cited as the 'North Carolina Naturopathic Doctors Licensure Act.' 10 11 "§ 90-731. Intent; purpose. 12 Intent. - The General Assembly finds that a significant number of residents of the (a) State of North Carolina choose complementary and alternative health care and declares that 13 14 naturopathic treatment is a distinct health care profession that affects the public health, safety, and welfare and provides for choices in health care. The General Assembly concludes that 15 licensure is in the current interest of North Carolina citizens to aid in protecting citizens from 16 17 deception, fraud, and damage to their health status. Licensure can provide a process in which citizens may more confidently rely on the level of skill, education, and competency possessed 18 19 by licensed persons. 20 Purpose. – The purpose of this Article is to provide standards for the licensure of (b) 21 naturopathic doctors desiring to practice naturopathic medicine in this State and to ensure the 22 maintenance of professional competence and acceptable standards of practice. 23 "§ 90-732. appropriate action.
" <u>§ 90-735. North Carolina Naturopathic Doctors Licensing Board.</u>
(a) Board. – The North Carolina Naturopathic Doctors Licensing Board is created. The
Board consists of seven members serving for staggered terms. The initial Board members shall
be appointed on or before January 1, 2012, as follows:
(1) The General Assembly, upon the recommendation of the President Pro
Tempore of the Senate, shall appoint two naturopathic doctors who are
licensed under this Article. One member shall serve a term of one year, and
one member shall serve a term of three years.
(2) The General Assembly, upon the recommendation of the Speaker of the
House of Representatives, shall appoint two naturopathic doctors who are
licensed under this Article. One member shall serve a term of one year, and
one member shall serve a term of two years.
(3) The Governor shall appoint two physicians licensed under Article 1 of
Chapter 90 of the General Statutes, at least one of whom shall be involved in
the practice of integrative medicine or who teaches integrative medicine at a
medical school. Both of these members shall serve a term of three years.
(4) <u>The Governor shall appoint for a two-year term a public member who is not</u>
a licensed health care professional and is not employed in a health care
profession.
Upon the expiration of the terms of the initial Board members, each member is appointed
for a term of three years, beginning on January 1 of each year. A member serves until the
member's successor is appointed. No member shall serve on the Board for more than two
consecutive terms. (b) Vacancias A member of the Roard serves at the placeure of the outhority that
(b) <u>Vacancies. – A member of the Board serves at the pleasure of the authority that</u> appointed the member. A vacancy shall be filled in the same manner as the original
appointed the memoer. A vacancy shall be med in the same manner as the original appointment. An appointee to fill a vacancy shall serve the remainder of the unexpired term and
until the appointee's successor has been duly appointed.
(c) Removal. – The Board may remove any of its members for neglect of duty,
incompetence, or unprofessional conduct. A member subject to disciplinary proceedings as a
licensee shall be disqualified from participating in the official business of the Board until the
charges have been resolved.
(d) <u>General Administration. – A Board member may not receive compensation but may</u>
receive reimbursement as provided in G.S. 93B-5. The officers of the Board include a chair, a
secretary, and any other officer deemed necessary by the Board to carry out the purposes of this
Article. All officers shall be elected annually by the Board at its first meeting held after
appointments to the Board are made. The Board shall hold a meeting within 45 days of the
appointment of new Board members. All officers shall serve one-year terms and shall serve
until their successors are elected and qualified. No person shall chair the Board for more than
five consecutive years. The Board may adopt rules governing the calling, holding, and
conducting of regular and special meetings. A majority of Board members constitutes a
quorum.

15	(a) The Department of Justice shall provide to the North Carolina Naturopathic Doctors
16	Licensing Board from the State and National Repositories of Criminal Histories the criminal
17	history of an applicant for licensure by the Board or a licensee of the Board. The Judicial
18	Department shall provide to the Department of Justice, along with the request, the fingerprints
19	of the applicant or licensee, a form signed by the applicant or licensee consenting to the
20	criminal history record check and use of fingerprints and other identifying information required
21	by the State and National Repositories, and any additional information required by the
22	Department of Justice. The fingerprints of the applicant or licensee shall be forwarded to the
23	State Bureau of Investigation for a search of the State's criminal history record file, and the
24	State Bureau of Investigation shall forward a set of fingerprints to the Federal Bureau of
25	Investigation for a national criminal history record check. The Judicial Department shall keep
26	all information obtained pursuant to this section confidential.
27	(b) The Department of Justice may charge a fee to offset the cost incurred by it to
28	conduct a criminal history record check under this section. The fee shall not exceed the actual
29	cost of locating, editing, researching, and retrieving the information."
30	SECTION 4. Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 90-735, as enacted by Section
31	1 of this act, the initial naturopathic doctors appointed to the North Carolina Naturopathic
32	Doctors Licensing Board must be North Carolina residents, must be licensed as a naturopathic
33	doctor in a state that licenses this profession, and must be eligible for licensure under
34	G.S. 90-737, as enacted by Section 1 of this act. Upon appointment, the appointee must
35	immediately seek to become licensed under this act.

SECTION 5. This act is effective when it becomes law.
