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1	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
2	AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE
3	UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA FOR THE BRODY SCHOOL OF
4	MEDICINE AT EAST CAROLINA UNIVERSITY TO CONSTRUCT A FAMILY
5	MEDICINE CENTER.
6	Whereas, the current Eastern Carolina Family Practice Center at the Brody
7	School of Medicine at East Carolina University was constructed in 1975 and since that
8	time has been the training home for more than 250 family doctors, most of whom
9	practice in North Carolina; and
10	Whereas, in any accredited residency training program for family medicine,
11	the "Center" is the centerpiece; and
12	Whereas, the "Center" is as important to the family physicians as
13	state-of-the-art operating rooms are to the training of surgeons; and
14	Whereas, the Eastern Carolina Family Practice Center is outdated and
15	overcrowded, and therefore the Department of Family Medicine can no longer
16	effectively compete in the recruitment of residents, fellows, and faculty; and
17	Whereas, inadequate facilities represent a challenge to delivery of quality care
18	for our citizenry; and
19	Whereas, states with the highest number of "general practitioners" per 1,000
20	patients rank significantly higher, both in terms of quality and cost-effectiveness of
21	health care; and
22	Whereas, without a new Family Medicine Center at the Brody School of
23	Medicine, a population of people with some of the worst health indicators in the nation
24	is going to be even more threatened; and
25	Whereas, family physicians receive four years of medical school education
26	followed by a minimum of three years of specialty training; and
27	Whereas, students who are trained in a state-of-the-art facility, motivated by
28	the full scope and range of responsibilities the challenging discipline demands, and are

strongly mentored in such an environment are much more likely to become family
physicians and remain in North Carolina; and

Whereas, the North Carolina General Assembly founded a medical school at East Carolina University, with a stated mission to train primary care (family care) physicians; and

6 Whereas, over seventy-five percent of medical school graduates who 7 complete their residency training in family medicine at our affiliated major teaching 8 hospital, Pitt County Memorial Hospital in Greenville, under the direct supervision of 9 the medical school faculty, remain in North Carolina to practice medicine; and

10 Whereas, the vast majority provides critically needed care in rural and 11 underserved communities; Now, therefore,

12 The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

13 **SECTION 1.** There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Board of

14 Governors of The University of North Carolina for the Brody School of Medicine the

sum of forty million dollars (\$40,000,000) for the 2005-2006 fiscal year to construct the

16 Family Medicine Center at the Brody School of Medicine at East Carolina University.

17 **SECTION 2.** This act becomes effective July 1, 2005.
