**SECTION 2.** G.S. 115C-47 is amended by adding four new subdivisions to 1 2 read: 3 "(45) To Address the Use of Pesticides in Schools. – Local boards of 4 education shall adopt policies that address the use of pesticides in 5 schools. These policies shall: 6 Require the principal or the principal's designee to annually 7 notify the students' parents, guardians, or custodians as well as 8 school staff of the schedule of pesticide use on school property 9 and their right to request notification. Such notification shall be 10 made, to the extent possible, at least 72 hours in advance of 11 nonscheduled pesticide use on school property. The notification 12 requirements under this subdivision do not apply to the 13 application of the following types of pesticide products: 14 antimicrobial cleansers, disinfectants, self-contained baits and 15 crack-and-crevice treatments, and any pesticide products classified by the United States Environmental Protection 16 17 Agency as belonging to the U.S.E.P.A. Toxicity Class IV, 18 "relatively nontoxic" (no signal word required on the product's 19 label). 20 Require the use of Integrated Pest Management. As used in this <u>b.</u> sub-subdivision, "Integrated Pest Management" or "IPM" 21 22 means the comprehensive approach to pest management that 23 combines biological, physical, chemical, and cultural tactics as 24 well as effective, economic, environmentally sound, and 25 socially acceptable methods to prevent and solve pest problems 26 that emphasizes pest prevention and provides a decision-making 27 process for determining if, when, and where pest suppression is 28 needed and what control tactics and methods are appropriate. 29 To Address Arsenic-Treated Wood in the Classroom and on School (46)30 Grounds. – Local boards of education shall prohibit the purchase or 31 acceptance of chromated copper arsenate-treated wood for future use 32 on school grounds. Local boards of education shall seal existing 33 arsenic-treated wood in playground equipment or establish a time line 34 for removing existing arsenic-treated wood on playgrounds, according 35 to the guidelines established under G.S. 115C-12(33). Local boards of 36 education are encouraged to test the soil on school grounds for 37 contamination caused by the leaching of arsenic-treated wood. 38 To Address Mercury in the Classroom and on School Grounds. -(47) Local boards of education are encouraged to remove and properly 39 40 dispose of all bulk elemental mercury, chemical mercury, and bulk 41 mercury compounds used as teaching aids in science classrooms, not 42 including barometers. Local boards of education shall prohibit the 43 future use of bulk elemental mercury, chemical mercury compounds,

3	(48) To Address Exposure to Diesel Exhaust Fumes. – Local boards of
4	education shall adopt policies and procedures to reduce students
5	exposure to diesel emissions."
6	<b>SECTION 3.</b> Nothing in this act shall be construed to create a private cause
7	of action against the State Board of Education, a local board of education, or their
8	agents or employees.
9	<b>SECTION 4.</b> G.S. 115C-47(45)b., as enacted by Section 2 of this act.
10	becomes effective October 1, 2011. The remainder of this act becomes effective
11	October 1, 2006.
