2	AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR IN-PERSON REGISTRATION AND VOTING AT
3	ONE-STOP ABSENTEE VOTING SITES.
4	The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:
5	SECTION 1. Article 7A of Chapter 163 of the General Statutes is amended
6	by adding a new section to read:
7	"§ 163-82.6A. In-person registration and voting at one-stop sites.
8	(a) Who May Register in Person. – In accordance with the provisions in this
9	section, an individual who is qualified to register to vote may register in person and then
10	vote at a one-stop voting site in the person's county of residence during the period for
11	one-stop voting provided under G.S. 163-227.2. For purposes of this section, a one-stop
12	voting site includes the county board of elections office, if that office is used for
13	one-stop voting.
14	(b) Documentation and Sworn Statement Required. – To register and vote under
15	this section, the person shall provide proof of residence, complete a registration form as
16	prescribed in G.S. 163-82.4, and sign a statement under penalty of perjury that the
17	person is a citizen of the United States and resides at the address given. The presentation
18	of any of the following valid documents that show the person's name and current
19	address is required as proof of residence: a North Carolina drivers license, photo
20	identification from a government agency, utility bill, bank statement, paycheck,
21	government check, or other government document. The State Board of Elections may
22	designate additional documents or methods that suffice and shall prescribe procedures
23	for establishing proof of residence.
24	(c) Voting With Retrievable Ballot. – A person who registers under this section
25	shall vote a retrievable absentee ballot as provided in G.S. 163-227.2 immediately after
26	registering. If a person declines to vote immediately, the registration shall be processed,

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1	and the person may later vote at a one-stop voting site under this section in the same
2	election.
3	(d) <u>Verification of Registration; Counting of Ballot. – Within two business days</u>
4	of the person's registration under this section, the county board of elections in
5	conjunction with the State Board of Elections shall verify the North Carolina drivers
6	license or Social Security number in accordance with G.S. 163-82.12, update the
7	statewide registration database and search for possible duplicate registrations, and
8	proceed under G.S. 163-82.7 to verify the person's address. The person's vote shall be
9	counted unless the county board determines that the applicant is not qualified to vote in
10	accordance with the provisions of this Chapter.
11	(e) <u>Change of Registration at One-Stop Voting Site. – A person who is already</u>
12	registered to vote in the county may update the information in the registration record in
13	accordance with procedures prescribed by the State Board of Elections, but an
14	individual's party affiliation may not be changed during the one-stop voting period
15	before any first or second partisan primary in which the individual is eligible to vote."
16	SECTION 2. G.S. 163-82.6(c), (d), and (e) read as rewritten:
17	"§ 163-82.6. Acceptance of voter registration application forms.
18	(c) Registration Deadlines for an Election. – In order to be valid for an election,
19	except as provided in G.S. 163-82.6A, the form:
20	(1) If submitted by mail, must be postmarked at least 25 days before the
21	election, except that any mailed application on which the postmark is
22	missing or unclear is validly submitted if received in the mail not later
23	than 20 days before the election,
24	(2) If submitted in person, by facsimile transmission, or by transmission of
25	a scanned document, must be received by the county board of elections
26	by a time established by that board, but no earlier than 5:00 P.M., on
27	the twenty-fifth day before the election,
28	(3) If submitted through a delegatee who violates the duty set forth in
29	subsection (a) of this section, must be signed by the applicant and
30	given to the delegatee not later than 25 days before the election, except
31	as provided in subsection (d) of this section.
32	(d) Instances When Person May Register and Vote on Election Day. <u>After the</u>
33	Standard Registration Deadline. – If a person has become qualified to register and vote
34	between the twenty-fifth day before an election and election day, then that person may
35	apply to register and vote at a one-stop site as provided in G.S. 163-82.6A, or may apply
36	to register on election day by submitting an application form described in G.S. 163-82.3
37	(a) or (b) to:
38	(1) A member of the county board of elections;
39	(2) The county director of elections; or
40	(3) The chief judge or a judge of the precinct in which the person is
41	eligible to vote,
42	and, if the application is approved, that person may vote the same day. The official in
43	subdivisions (1) through (3) of this subsection to whom the application is submitted
44	shall decide whether the applicant is eligible to vote. The applicant shall present to the

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1 official written or documentary evidence that the applicant is the person he represents 2 himself to be. The official, if in doubt as to the right of the applicant to register, may 3 require other evidence satisfactory to that official as to the applicant's qualifications. If 4 the official determines that the person is eligible, the person shall be permitted to vote in 5 the election and the county board shall add the person's name to the list of registered 6 voters. If the official denies the application, the person shall be permitted to vote a 7 challenged ballot under the provisions of G.S. 163-88.1, and may appeal the denial to 8 the full county board of elections. The State Board of Elections shall promulgate rules 9 for the county boards of elections to follow in hearing appeals for denial of election day 10 applications to register. No person shall be permitted to register on the day of a second 11 primary unless he shall have become the person becomes qualified to register and vote 12 between the date of the first primary and the date of the succeeding second primary and 13 was not qualified to register and vote in the first primary. 14 (e) For purposes of subsection (d) of this section, persons who "become qualified 15 to register and vote" during a time period:period 16 (1)Include include those who during that time period are naturalized as citizens of the United States or who are restored to citizenship after a 17 18 conviction of a felony; but 19 (2)Do not include persons who reach the age of 18 during that time 20 period, if those persons were eligible to register while 17 years old 21 during an earlier period." 22 **SECTION 3.** G.S. 163-227.2(a) reads as rewritten: 23 Any voter eligible to vote by absentee ballot under G.S. 163-226 may request "(a) 24 an application for absentee ballots, complete the application, and vote under the 25 provisions of this section.section and of G.S. 163-82.6A, as applicable." 26 **SECTION 4.** The State Board of Elections shall monitor the implementation 27 of this act and determine the feasibility and timetable for expanding same-day 28 registration and voting to all voting places on Election Day. The State Board shall report 29 its findings no later than March 1, 2008, to the Joint Legislative Commission on 30 Governmental Operations of the General Assembly. 31 **SECTION 5.** Sections 1, 2, and 3 of this act become effective July 1, 2007, 32 and shall apply to all primaries and elections held on or after that date. The remainder of 33 this act is effective when it becomes law.
