6		SECT	TION 1. Article 1 of Chapter 90 of the General Statutes is amended by
7	adding a	new se	ction to read:

9	<u>(a)</u>	For p	urposes of this section, the following definitions shall apply:
10		<u>(1)</u>	Non-ablative treatment. – Any laser or intense pulsed light treatment
11			that is not expected or intended to incise, remove, burn, or vaporize the
12			epidermal surface of the skin, including treatments related to laser hair
13			<u>removal.</u>
14		<u>(2)</u>	Physician An individual licensed by the North Carolina Medical
15			Board to practice medicine.
16	<u>(b)</u>	<u>A</u> pe	rson, other than a physician licensed under this Article, may use
17	<u>non-abla</u>	tive trea	atment in the practice of medicine only under the following conditions:
18		<u>(1)</u>	A supervising physician is on-site or readily available to the person
19			performing the non-ablative treatment consistent with the appropriate
20			standard of care for the profession.
21		<u>(2)</u>	The supervising physician has established written protocols that
22			provide, as a minimum, a statement identifying the supervising
23			physician responsible for the performance of the non-ablative
24			treatment and all persons authorized to use the specified laser or
25			intense pulsed light device, the methods by which the laser or intense
26			pulsed light device is to be operated, and a description of the
27			appropriate care and follow-up for common complications, serious
28			injury, or emergencies resulting from the use of non-ablative
29			treatment.

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1		(3) The supervising physician has ensured that the non-licensed person ha
2		adequate training and education to perform non-ablative treatment.
3		(4) If medication is prescribed or dispensed in connection with the
4		non-ablative treatment, the supervising physician has ensured that
5		before prescribing or dispensing medication, the patient has been
6		examined by a physician licensed to practice medicine in this State, the
7		prescription is medically indicated for the treatment, and the patien
8		has received thorough instructions on the safe use and application o
9		the medication.
10	<u>(c)</u>	Only a physician may use lasers or intense pulsed light devices for ablative
11	procedure	<u>es.</u>
12	<u>(d)</u>	Before any initial non-ablative treatment, and at any time thereafter when
13	•	r indicated, a physician licensed by the Board shall examine the patient and
14		atient's medical chart.
15	<u>(e)</u>	The supervising physician shall retain full legal and professional
16	-	ility for any patient receiving non-ablative treatment.
17	<u>(f)</u>	Any professional corporation offering non-ablative treatment shall comply
18		equirements of Chapter 55B of the General Statutes.
19	<u>(g)</u>	The Board may adopt rules it deems necessary to enforce this section and
20	<u>regulate t</u>	he use of non-ablative treatment in the practice of medicine in this State."
21		SECTION 2. This act is effective when it becomes law.
