	"§ 90-735. North Carolina Naturopathic Doctors Licensing Board.
	(a) Board. – The North Carolina Naturopathic Doctors Licensing Board is created. The
	Board consists of seven members serving for staggered terms. The initial Board members shall
	be appointed on or before January 1, 2014, as follows:
	(1) The General Assembly, upon the recommendation of the President Pro
	Tempore of the Senate, shall appoint two naturopathic doctors who are
	licensed under this Article. One member shall serve a term of one year, and
	one member shall serve a term of three years.
	(2) The General Assembly, upon the recommendation of the Speaker of the
	House of Representatives, shall appoint two naturopathic doctors who are
	licensed under this Article. One member shall serve a term of one year, and
	one member shall serve a term of two years.
	(3) The Governor shall appoint two physicians licensed under Article 1 of
	Chapter 90 of the General Statutes, at least one of whom shall be involved in
	the practice of integrative medicine or who teaches integrative medicine at a
	medical school. Both of these members shall serve a term of three years.
	(4) The Governor shall appoint for a two-year term a public member who is not
	a licensed health care professional and is not employed in a health care
	profession.
	Upon the expiration of the terms of the initial Board members, each member shall be
	appointed for a term of three years. The term of a member shall begin on January 1 of each
	year. A member shall serve until the member's successor is appointed. No member shall serve
	on the Board for more than two consecutive terms.
	(b) Vacancies. – A member of the Board serves at the pleasure of the authority that
	appointed the member. A vacancy shall be filled in the same manner as the original
	appointment. An appointee to fill a vacancy shall serve the remainder of the unexpired term and
	until the appointee's successor has been duly appointed.
	(c) <u>Removal. – The Board may remove any of its members for neglect of duty</u>
	incompetence, or unprofessional conduct. A member subject to disciplinary proceedings as a
	licensee shall be disqualified from participating in the official business of the Board until the
	<u>charges have been resolved.</u>
	(d) <u>General Administration. – A Board member may not receive compensation but may</u>
	receive reimbursement as provided in G.S. 93B-5. The officers of the Board include a chair, a
	secretary, and any other officer deemed necessary by the Board to carry out the purposes of this
	Article. All officers shall be elected annually by the Board at its first meeting held after
	appointments to the Board are made. The Board shall hold a meeting within 45 days of the
	appointment of new Board members. All officers shall serve one-year terms and shall serve
	until their successors are elected and qualified. No person shall chair the Board for more than five consecutive years. The Board may adopt rules governing the calling holding and
	five consecutive years. The Board may adopt rules governing the calling, holding, and conducting of regular and special meetings. A majority of Board members constitutes a

6	(1) The level of seriousness of the crime.
7	(2) The date of the crime.
8	(3) The age of the person at the time of the conviction.
9	(4) The circumstances surrounding the commission of the crime, if known.
10	(5) The nexus between the criminal conduct of the person and the job duties of
11	the position to be filled.
12	(6) The person's prison, jail, probation, parole, rehabilitation, and employment
13	records since the date the crime was committed.
14	(7) The subsequent commission of a crime by the person.
15	(c) Denial of Licensure. – If the Board denies, revokes, or suspends a license based on
16	information obtained in a criminal history record check, the Board shall disclose to the person
17	the information contained in the criminal history record check that is relevant to the Board's
18	actions. The Board may not provide a copy of the criminal history record check to the person.
19	A person has the right to appear before the Board to appeal the Board's decision. An
20	appearance before the Board shall constitute an exhaustion of administrative remedies in
21	accordance with Chapter 150B of the General Statutes.
22	(d) Limited Immunity. – The Board, its officers and employees, acting in good faith and
23	in compliance with this section, shall be immune from civil liability for its actions based on
24	information provided in a person's criminal history record check.
25	" <u>§ 90-742. Reports; immunity from suit.</u>
26	(a) <u>Report. – A person who has reasonable cause to suspect misconduct or incapacity of</u>
27	a licensee, or who has reasonable cause to suspect that a person is in violation of this Article,
28	may report the relevant facts to the Board. Upon receipt of a charge, or upon its own initiative,
29	the Board may give notice of an administrative hearing or may, after diligent investigation,
30	dismiss unfounded charges. A person who, in good faith, makes a report pursuant to this
31	section is immune from any criminal prosecution or civil liability resulting from making the
32	<u>report.</u>
