A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 2 AN ACT TO INCREASE THE PUNISHMENT FOR A CHARGE OF ASSAULTING A LAW 3 ENFORCEMENT OFFICER, PROBATION OFFICER, OR PAROLE OFFICER THAT IS 4 DISCHARGING OR ATTEMPTING TO DISCHARGE THE OFFICER'S DUTIES AND 5 WHERE SERIOUS BODILY INJURY IS INFLICTED AND TO CREATE A RELATED 6 CRIMINAL CHARGE FOR INSTANCES WHEN AN OFFICER'S SERIOUS BODILY 7 INJURY IS CAUSED BY AN INDIVIDUAL RESISTING, DELAYING, OR 8 OBSTRUCTING THE OFFICER.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

**SECTION 1.** G.S. 14-34.7(a) reads as rewritten:

Unless covered under some other provision of law providing greater punishment, a "(a) person is guilty of a Class F-E felony if the person assaults a law enforcement officer, probation officer, or parole officer while the officer is discharging or attempting to discharge his or her official duties and inflicts serious bodily injury on the officer."

**SECTION 2.** G.S. 14-223 reads as rewritten:

## "§ 14-223. Resisting officers.

If any person shall willfully and unlawfully resist, delay or obstruct a public officer in discharging or attempting to discharge a duty of his office, he shall be guilty of a Class 2 misdemeanor. Unless the conduct is covered under some other provision of law providing greater punishment, a person who willfully and unlawfully resists, delays, or obstructs a public officer in discharging or attempting to discharge a duty of his or her office is guilty of the following:

- A Class E felony if the person inflicts serious bodily injury on the officer. (1)
- A Class H felony if the person inflicts physical injury on the officer. (2)
- A Class 2 misdemeanor for any other violation of this section."
  - **SECTION 3.** This act becomes effective December 1, 2019.
